# Introduction

Choosing a firearm for use as a defensive tool is a big decision. It is a statement about your willingness to accept the responsibility for your safety and the safety of those you love. To be correct they must be based on facts collected through solid research and evidence presented by reliable sources.

So, now you have decided to keep a firearm for self-defense. Which gun is right for you? Unfortunately the criteria are quite subjective. The parameters are intensely personal. Will you be defending yourself in your home or on the street? Will you carry the gun concealed on your person or in a fanny pack, purse or attaché case? Do you have the physical strength and dexterity to handle firearm of a certain style or size? Which caliber will work best? That question alone can open the door to hours of debate that will not result in a clear answer.

Those who prefer to be glib might say, "The best gun to have in a gunfight is the gun you have

with you when the gunfight starts." That's a non-answer. How do you get from having no gun to making a knowledgeable decision about choosing an appropriate firearm for self-defense? You do research. This book is one portion of that research. It should by no means be your only point of reference. You will need this book and others. You will also need plenty of practical experience and advice from people you trust. This book will show you what's available and give you a good look at some of the options you have when it comes to choosing a gun for self-defense. Further

research will help you narrow the field. Practical experience will show what works for you and what doesn't. Effective professional training will make you proficient.

You may never need to use your firearm for self-defense, but when you do, nothing else will really do. And nothing but action backed up by confidence in your decisions will get you through such a trial.

You've made the choice. Now you begin gaining the confidence.

# Repetition Builds Skill

Whether you are swinging a golf club, dribbling a basketball or firing a round at the center of a target, the key to success is repetition. I read somewhere that a person must complete something like 7,000 repetitions to truly master a skill. Doing so teaches the muscles how the activity should feel. Once the muscles know what it feels like to complete an action, you begin to move almost instinctively. Once that happens you begin to see true consistency in your shooting and can work on increasing the speed of the sequence.

This, of course, works on the presupposition that your practice is based on proper techniques.

Therefore, the first step to effective practice is proper training. This is especially true when handling firearms for self-defense. A knowledgeable expert must teach you, and you must work diligently to emulate that training in your practice sessions. I will not pretend that an article of this length can cover all the salient points and subtle nuances of defensive firearms training. That training must be done on a range, under the watchful eyes of an expert. Find a school. Spend the money and while you are involved in the training, immerse yourself in the teachings of your instructor.

Then come home and practice... regularly.

Here are some tips to improve the quality of your practice sessions:

## **Focus on the fundamentals:**

High hand, crush-grip, front sight, roll the trigger. During the StressFire course Mas Ayooob made a clear point of telling every shooter that consistently accurate shooting cannot be expected with inconsistent firearms manipulation. In layman's terms: Hold the gun the same way every time. And to that end Mas wanted us to squeeze the gripframe hard for every shot. After that, focus on the front sight and control that trigger. Think about fundamentals and practice using them until they are ingrained. You high school coach was right when he said "you play like you practice." The skills you need come only from muscle memory. While training at Front Sight in Nevada, I was constantly reminded that in a real fight I would perform at only about half the level at which I performed in training. By focusing on the fundamentals I was able to raise my training scores to the point where I was confident that 50 percent would be good enough.

**Practice from real positions:** In a gunfight you will be shooting from cover or concealment. You will be shooting while moving to cover. You might even be shooting from odd or unstable positions. Within the bounds of safe shooting and range rules, shoot from non-standard positions. Use a post to simulate a barricade. Go prone. If it is safe to do so move to within 7 yards of the target and shoot while backing up. Just

remember all the while to focus on the fundamentals.

**Start slowly:** Speed kills. Going to town with serious rapid-fire training can cause you to forget the fundamentals. First, get good going slowly. Then get great going slowly. Then speed up.

**Quit when you get tired:** No matter how tough and strong you are, fatigue will compromise your shooting skills. If your performance starts to fade, stop the practice session. To build your endurance, don't practice longer, that could encourage you to adopt sloppy habits. Instead practice more often.

**Get a range bag:** Keeping an organized range bag is one of the best ways to insure productive practice. If you have everything you need in one place — ammo, hearing protection, targets, staple gun, etc. — all you need to do is grab your pistol and the bag and head to the range. When the practice session is over, simply put everything

back in the bag and you're ready for the next outing.

**Don't draw to the shot:** While it might seem like a good idea to practice drawing the pistol from your holster and shooting at the target, resist that urge. Remember, practice builds muscle memory and teaches us to reflexively complete the action. Most of the time when you pull a gun you will be holding someone at gunpoint and the situation may be defused without firing. If you have trained yourself to draw and reflexively fire, you may end up facing an angry district attorney who believes you could have solved the problem without firing a shot. A better means of practice is to draw (keep your finger off the trigger), and then command your "adversary" to stop and put down the weapon before you decide to fire. That's more likely the sequence you'll go through in a real self-defense scenario.

## ***What about ammo?***

All of this means you'll have to make an investment in ammunition. For several years I opted to reload ammo for my pistols and revolvers. Not having the latest and greatest reloading gear I soon found that I couldn't keep up. Figuring my time was worth something, I started looking at the real cost of reloading and determined that for my needs I was better off buying my ammunition in bulk.

At this writing I can, from any mail-order house, get 1,000 rounds of Wolf brand .40 S&W for \$125 plus shipping. At most gun shows I can save the cost of shipping. I use Wolf as an example because when I started shooting it a few people I know looked down their noses at this "imported surplus" ammo. They did so until I completed the 400-round StressFire handgun course without so much as a hiccup and qualified with a score of 299 out of 300. Wolf ammo may be imported, but it certainly is not surplus. I've never had reason to complain about its performance or accuracy and especially not the price. If there was one drawback to Wolf Ammo, it was

that the cases were lacquer-coated. Some people with really fast trigger fingers and lots of high-capacity magazines might, and I repeat "might" have experienced a jam if the chamber got hot enough to melt the lacquer. I never had it happen and never saw it happen even while watching thousands of rounds go downrange. But it gave some people a reason so complain. That reason is now gone. For 2004 the folks at Wolf replaced the lacquer with an advanced-technology polymer coating to several of their most popular center-fire calibers. I thought the stuff worked great before. They say it works better now.

There are lots of other ammunition suppliers out there and the shelves are full of books that can teach you all you need to know about reloading. Choose one supplier, or build your own reloading bench and get some ammo for you firearm. The bottom line is this. You need to practice and dry practice, while very important, can only take you so far. Shoot real ammo and shoot as much as you can afford. Building skill takes time and practice, but the benefits far outweigh the costs.

# LASER SIGHTS: Real Benefit With A Warning

Almost since the invention of the laser people have been trying, with varying degrees of success, to use the instrument as a sighting device for firearms. As technology improved and dependable lasers became small enough to easily handle and mounting hardware began to provide repeatable accuracy, the dream of a laser sight became a reality.

Today you can, quite easily, equip a firearm with a laser, focus the dot on a target and fire for effect. And they work. Modern laser sights are small, light and durable. Modern batteries provide adequate power and the adjustments can be held in place under all but the most violent recoil. So, with all the hype and hoopla, should you or should you not equip your defensive firearm with a laser sight?

This is where the subjective nature of the debate takes over.

Yes, laser sights work. Some work quite well. But you need to review your personal needs and desires before you choose something on which you will stake your life.

Some of the benefits laser sights offer include:

#### **Instinctive Activation** —

Most lasers are pressure-activated. Just grip your gun naturally and the laser comes on. No on/off switch to find. No extra button to push. No fumbling when seconds count.

#### **Rapid Target Acquisition**

— The laser beam can be quickly directed to your target. In a life-threatening situation your eyes often lock on to the threat. With the beam projected on the target you can find it quickly and position it precisely.

**Enhanced Accuracy From Various Positions** — Without the need to acquire a traditional sight picture you can bring accurate fire to bear from a wide variety of positions, even those in which you are at a tactical disadvantage.

#### **A Measure Of Deterrence**

— The jury is still out on the reaction of a thug when faced with the flash of a laser sight. Some will cease hostilities. Some will only pause. Others may never even notice the presence of the laser. Remember, violent encounters happen

quickly and the attacker may not be paying attention to a tiny red dot on his chest.

## ***The Other Side Of The Coin***

Just as it is true that for every action there is an equal and opposite reaction, any discussion of laser sight must include a review of their drawbacks. Laser sights are not perfect.

One major concern associated with laser sights is that all mechanical devices will eventually fail. Traditional iron sights are very tough, very simple and rarely fail. While the failure rate of laser sights may be very low, there is still the possibility that the shooter will engage the switch and have

nothing happen. And if that possibility becomes a reality, the owner of a laser-sighted pistol has to shift focus immediately. This shift in focus is both literal and figurative. With the laser sight in operation, all your attention can be focused on the attacker. That's a natural instinct and that's where the red dot from the laser is projected. Should that red dot fail, the shooter is required to develop an effective sight picture immediately and while under extreme stress. The stress is not only that of a violent encounter, but also the understanding that your aiming system has failed. To achieve a proper sight picture with your iron sights you must shift focus from the target to the front sight. The front sight must

be aligned with the rear sight and the combination placed on the target. To aim effectively, the sight must remain in focus and the target will appear out of focus. If you have come to rely on your laser sight and suppressed or completely forgotten the sequence of establishing a proper sight picture, this shift under stress can be very tough and will likely result in errant shots.

The ability to focus on the front sight during a high-stress and violent encounter is something that must be learned through repetitive practice. The common knock against laser sights is that they reinforce poor shooting habits. Used regularly, the laser sight can teach shooters to look over or around the gun and focus on the target, thus

when the front sight is really needed the shooter will, under stress, forget that basic element of accurate shooting. Solve that problem by not using the laser sight regularly. Sight-in the laser at an adequate self-defense distance and leave it alone. Practice only with the iron sights. Run every type of drill you can think of using only the iron sights. Switch on the laser sight's master control only when you are not in a practice situation, but well before you find yourself in a self-defense situation. There's no need to be fumbling for a master switch under the stress of an attack.

Crimson Trace, makers of the Laser Grip laser sight, also embraces this philosophy. Here's a passage directly from their Internet site:

*At Crimson Trace, we believe you should always be able to sight and shoot a handgun without a laser. This new technology was never meant to replace your fixed sights, but to supplement them in difficult situations, like firing on the move or from awkward positions, defending yourself in close quarters, aiming in low light where iron sights are difficult to see, and any time that you're under stress. Under these kinds of conditions, our natural and automatic reaction is to focus on the threat, not the gun sights.*

That's a powerful statement from the maker of a tested and battle-proven product. While the comment points out the importance of acquiring and continuing to practice good marksmanship skills; it stops short of reminding those who carry firearms for self-defense that one of the toughest things to do under stress is shift focus from the threat to the sights of a handgun. To do so effectively requires continued practice in the fundamentals of good

marksmanship. Anything short of such practice will leave the shooter ill-prepared for the encounter. In that case, a laser sight should not be considered a quick fix. No competent firearms instructor would suggest anything but that a shooter first acquire proficiency with iron sights before moving to a laser.

With all that said, there are indeed some instances where laser sights provide a definite advantage. Indeed, in some situations a laser will work when almost nothing else will. In a close-quarters fight that quickly devolves in a struggle for your weapon a laser sight will help you get an aimed shot off even if you can't see the sights. This is where the laser sight really (excuse the pun) shines. In such a struggle one of the key elements of using a firearm at such close range is to insure you don't shoot yourself. The laser sight lets you know precisely where round will impact, regardless of your shooting position. Police officers can use a laser to sight around a tactical shield. This is not something the average armed citizen will be faced with, but it shows the ability to fire from an awkward position.

One often overlooked element of the laser sight is its benefit as a training tool. During dry practice the beam of the laser shows a shooter exactly what happens when a trigger is jerked. It can also prove to the shooter that double-action can be nearly as accurate as single-action, as long as the basic elements of marksmanship are adhered to.

The most talked about benefit of the laser sight has to be its performance in low light. Most attacks occur in low light and a laser will indeed help you get off an aimed shot. But it is still a shot in the dark. The best option for low-light fighting is to carry a light. Positive target

identification is of paramount importance. Not only will such identification prevent the tragedy of shooting an innocent person, it will also bolster your claim of self-defense during the inevitable investigation following the use of lethal force. With a light you know exactly who your target is and can clearly judge his intent. Streamlight offers a weapon-mounted light/laser combination or a Laser Grip accompanied by a hand-held light will accomplish the same things. Either way, the first rule of shooting is to know your target.

The other downside of a using a laser in a dark environment is that, like tracers, lasers work both ways. If your laser sight is casting beam directly from you to your target, it is also casting a beam from your target to you. The realistic odds of this having a huge bearing on the outcome of the shootout may be pretty slim, but it is a factor. Another factor could be the accidental activation of the laser when you are trying to hide. A pressure switch activates most lasers when the firearm is held in the firing grasp. In a high-stress situation, you can count on grasping your firearm tightly enough to activate the switch. Will that give away your position? Again, the odds are slim that you'll be in such a situation, but it is something to consider.

In the end, the decision to use a laser sight is intensely personal. In a real-world self-defense scenario, a laser will likely help you. But nothing is perfect and you should not stake your entire defensive plan on the benefits of a laser. Such a sight may indeed help in times of intense stress and in situations that require rapid response. Combine a solid base of effective shooting skills with a well-built laser sight and you will certainly have a combination capable of saving your life. ❄



# Dry Practice:

## *Building Confidence and Skills Off the Range*

At the range with live bullets, shooting at standard silhouettes or, better yet, inside simulated scenario theaters, is far and away the finest way you can practice your weaponry skills. Or is it?

Firing on a range will definitely verify that our handgun actually fires bullets. Range firing will show us that our sights are aligned properly and our sight picture is correct. But, when push comes to shove, that is really all range firing does.

Now, if you live so close to a range that you go every day and you have an unlimited supply of ammunition, then, by all means, use the range for practice. Most of us don't live next door to a range, however. Getting to the range becomes a problem of time whether we like it or not. Nor is our ammunition supply unlimited.

So, how are we going to practice on a regular basis to get the skills necessary in a life-and-death situation? How are we going to maintain and improve upon the skills we have been taught?

### ***Dry Practice: What is it? Why is it Essential?***

That's where something called "dry practice" comes in. You may have heard of this before being referred to as "cold practice." No matter what you call it, dry practice is the method of building your skill and confidence level without the range and without bullets.

And, take care not to call this "dry fire" as it is impossible to fire an unloaded weapon without bullets. This distinction becomes

absolutely vital on a range. There can be no confusion on this. It is called dry practice. Period.

No bullets, no punching holes in paper—how can that help? Actually it can, and does help more than you'd think. In fact, dry practice training is absolutely necessary to improving and ingraining your skills.

Think about it for a moment. The firing pin or hammer dropping on the primer, the bullet leaving the chamber and barrel of the gun, traveling to a target, is all the result of one single action. The trigger break is all that's needed. It is something as simple as curling your index finger.

In order to get to that simple step you need to master a number of other vital steps that occur before, as well as after, that simple finger curl. That's what makes dry practice so crucial. It allows you to practice the entire sequence of events from start to finish, from bringing the pistol to the ready position to re-holstering after the action.

There's another reason dry practice is essential. There are a lot of ranges that will not allow you to practice your skills with a handgun from a holstered or concealed position. We're not talking about target practice per se in this book, we're talking about personal defense. How many times will you be in a real personal defense situation when your handgun is already out of its holster and aimed at the target?

You need to practice realistically in order to practice perfectly in order to achieve perfect performance. Your handgun doesn't need practice in order to have the bullet leave the barrel. That process is simple mechanics. You need the practice, however, so your movements before and after the hammer fall become just as mechanical.

There is no way to mimic, or practice, one thing that will happen when faced with a potentially deadly situation. That one thing is the body's biologic response to the stress involved.

In a life-threatening engagement, your body will be under stress, a huge amount of stress. That stress will release a load of adrenaline. Adrenaline will have a huge negative impact on your body's ability to function coherently. Your mind will become a bit scrambled, your fine motor coordination will be significantly impacted in a negative way. Under these conditions you can only expect your body to be half as effective as it is under a non-stressful situation.

Dry practice, perfect dry practice done consistently, will help alleviate a good percentage of that degradation. When the movements and the skills become ingrained through practice drills, your body's ability to perform those skills under times of stress will not be as significantly impacted. You'll be better. Much better.

The Front Sight Firearms Training Institute puts it this way, "When faced with the stress

of a life-threatening engagement, we don't rise to the occasion, we descend to our level of training."

## ***The Mind Set and Practice Location***

It starts and ends between your ears. Safety is completely up to you and your ability to engage that computer located above your neck and set it to safe. Mechanical devices, devices like handguns, are not the safety issue. You are.

Dry practice is serious business, it is not play. You are practicing with a tool that, when coupled with the conscious act of trigger squeeze and ammunition, can take a life. The only thing missing in dry practice is the bullet. That is all. And that's everything.

As you become familiar with your handgun there is a better than good possibility that you will reach a point of familiarization where you "know" everything there is to know about it. At that point is when you become complacent. You and your familiarity have just become lethal.

Negligent discharges can be and often are the result of this complacency. In reality there is

no excuse for a negligent discharge. None. During dry practice you must be absolutely focused on the task at hand. There can be no distractions. It must be structured. It must be serious. When it is there won't be any need for excuses. You'll never have to say, "I didn't mean to shoot."

Choosing a practice environment is crucial to the success of your dry practice sessions. The number one rule in choosing a practice location is that you must have absolute control over it. There can be no distractions.

The TV needs to be turned off. Same with the stereo. If there are family members in the house or apartment send them outside, the fresh air will do them good. Close the drapes. Take the phone off the hook. The point here is the dry practice room needs to be its own isolated environment. There can be no distractions. You must make this room as safe as physically and mentally possible.

Physical safety comes in the form of where you choose to do your dry practice. In the best of worlds you will have a room in the house that has a wall capable of stopping bullet. True, this practice is without ammunition, but...

Cinder block walls are ideal for this, so maybe the basement will be your best bet. The point is this, you want to use the absolute safest room possible, and then you make it even safer by taking out the distractions.

### ***Target Choice and Ammunition Separation***

It is all too easy to find a "convenient" target. Dry practice is not convenient, and neither should targets be those of convenience.

Targets should be specific. A simple piece of paper with a silhouette drawn on it is perfect. You can, and you should, dry practice at different distances,

using larger and smaller silhouette drawings to the feeling of depth. Tape these targets to a wall that could stop a bullet.

Never use a light switch or the corner of a room. Never a picture and never a television screen. In order to maintain the proper mindset, in order to maintain the controlled, distraction-free environment, your target(s) must be specific. They also must be used only during dry practice situations.

You can probably see why televisions, paintings and the like shouldn't be used. They are always around you and you may, at one point or another, be tempted to "practice" when you are not entirely focused. That is a very dangerous situation.

It is also very dangerous to have any ammunition anywhere near you during dry practice training. You need to separate yourself entirely from all ammunition.

The first step is to unload the weapon. Place the ammunition in

a container of some sort. Empty your pockets, ensuring there are no bullets. Take off any devices used to store ammunition such as magazine holders, speed loaders and all magazines. Empty the ammunition from all of these into the container you used when you emptied the weapon.

When all devices are empty and the ammunition is in one storage container, take that container and place it in another, entirely separate room. Return to

the dry practice room and double-check all of the carrying devices to ensure that they are free of all ammunition.

You will need the carrying devices to do your dry practice drills so return them now to their normal position on your belt or harness when you are armed.

So, where are we?

We have gained the proper mindset and are entirely focused. We have found a proper location to practice, free of all distractions

and safe. We have made targets specific for the purpose of dry practice. And finally we have ensured that there is no ammunition in the room in which we are practicing. It's time to actually dry practice.

## ***What to Practice***

In one word, everything. Every skill you know, every skill you have been taught needs to be practiced. Now is not the time to try out something new, however. Only practice those skills and techniques you are familiar with. Practicing beyond your scope of knowledge is downright dangerous and leads to ingraining bad habits in your memory.

Practicing the movements associated with loading and unloading must be covered. Remember, movements only. Gaining muscle memory is the reason for this. By repetition we learn.

Target acquisition, too. This includes a proper stance, a proper grip and bringing the

handgun up so that the front sight is centered on the target. From there, practice aligning the front and back sights, concentrating on the front sight to gain an absolute focus.

And, it includes the potentially deadly action of the trigger squeeze. This includes taking up the slack and getting the surprise click of the hammer falling on an empty chamber. The front sight must not move during the hammer fall. If the front sight does move then it wasn't a surprise at all. At the range, or in a life-and-death situation, any movement of that front sight during the hammer fall will send the bullet off target.

Then there are malfunction problems to practice, practicing to replace empty magazines or use speed loaders, checking your surroundings after the hammer fall for any other potential threats— all must be practiced.

These skills mentioned above are just the basics. They apply to everyone in any situation imaginable.

There are different ways we carry our handguns however, different places we position them so they are available if the time comes. These contingencies must also be practiced in dry practice sessions.

For instance, say you have a handgun in your nightstand. If you do not practice the entire movement from opening the nightstand and establishing a proper grip and sight alignment then really how effective is that handgun in the nightstand? If you carry a handgun in a holster under a light jacket how effective can you be at a moment's notice if you haven't practiced gripping and clearing that pistol and bringing it to a firing position? What about inside a purse or a fanny pack? The point is this— you need to practice as close to real situations as you can.

Speed will be a concern to you at first. Everyone wants to be fast. But, at least initially, you should not consider speed at all. You need to practice absolutely correct techniques. After a period of time when you have used dry practice sessions in an absolutely correct manner you will find your speed improving. This is over time, not overnight.

## ***A Final Thought***

Back at the beginning of this chapter we talked about the range and live fire not being the best training for personal defense. Most ranges don't allow

shooting from a holster, much less a concealed carry position. Ranges don't have nightstands or desk drawers. You can't get to them on a regular basis in most cases. Bullets cost a fair amount of money. Yet, all of these things must become second nature, they must become ingrained into your muscle and nervous system memory for you to be consistently effective.

Have regularly scheduled dry practice sessions, say twice weekly. Use the range to verify your dry practice sessions. The dry practice sessions are where you will build upon your skills. ☆

The institute's president, Dr. Ignatius Piazza, has graciously allowed its reproduction in this chapter.

### **Front Sight Training Institute Dry Practice Checklist**

- **Set a realistic dry practice goal before you start. A long practice session is not necessarily better because quality— not quantity— is the goal.**
- **Establish the proper mindset for dry practice.**
- **Establish and maintain control of your dry practice environment to eliminate all possible distractions.**
- **UNLOAD THE WEAPON AND YOURSELF and place the ammunition in another room.**
- **Chamber check the weapon to verify that it is unloaded and say, "The weapon is unloaded and I am ready for dry practice."**
- **Select an appropriately sized target and place it on a solid surface capable of stopping a bullet.**
- **Chamber check the weapon again and then begin dry practice.**
- **Terminate the dry practice session before significant physical and mental fatigue set in.**
- **Remove the dry practice target immediately upon finishing the dry practice session.**
- **Return the weapon to fighting mode— loaded and placed in its usual location such as a holster, fanny pack, briefcase, or nightstand.**
- **Say aloud, "The weapon is loaded and dry practice is over."**

# GPS of Personal Defense: *Grip, Presentation and Stance*

The absolute beginning and end of personal protection, of self-defense, is your ability to fight through the adrenaline and yes, the fear factor, involved in a life-threatening situation. No matter how good you may be on the range, it is under conditions of intense stress that your abilities to protect yourself and your family or friends will be tested.

On the range there is no threat. You have plenty of time to load or reload, to align the sights on the paper or steel target, and easily take the slack out of the trigger and get that surprise trigger break sending the bullet downrange.

On a darkened street with an armed assailant or suddenly awoken from a sound sleep with a home invader those seconds disappear. Now is not the time to monkey around ensuring you have a proper grip. Your grip must be perfect. Now is not the time to wave the handgun around squinting at the sights trying to align them. Your sight alignment must be perfect.

In another chapter of this book you'll find a complete discussion of a style of training called "dry practice." In that chapter you'll find just how important this style of training is to your ability to function properly when the time comes. But, there are a few things you should consider before you start to dry practice in order to get the most out of it. Some of these won't change no matter how you choose to carry your handgun,

or even where you place it so it is ready at a moment's notice. Some will however.

## ***The Basic Grip and Presentation***

The one, single, most important skill to perfect is the basic grip. Calling it basic is almost a disservice as this basic grip is the end point in consistent shooting both on the range and in a life and death situation. There are not any variables in this. It must be done the same way each time your handgun is pointed downrange.

For the sake of clarification the grip is something you do, not something that is on the weapon. You grip the weapon by the tang.

No matter how the weapon is carried or stored you must grip

the weapon with the firing hand high on the tang. If your weapon is an autoloader the soft flesh found between your thumb and index finger is just underneath the slide. If your weapon is a revolver it is just underneath the hammer. That index finger of yours should be along the frame, just above the trigger and completely out from the inside of the trigger guard.

Once the weapon is cleared from its carrying position or stored position the weapon is brought up. Here you will be dropping and rotating your firing arm shoulder just a bit. The end result is that your firing arm elbow will end up being tucked into the area just below your firing side ribs. Your firing arm forearm will be parallel with the ground and the weapon will be

pointed in the direction of the threat. The trigger finger throughout all of this remains alongside the frame and away from the trigger.

Now, in one smooth and sharp move you use your firing arm to push the weapon forward while the supporting hand comes up to meet the firing hand. The thumb of the supporting hand covers the thumb of the firing hand while the fingers of the supporting hand cover the middle, ring and little finger of the firing hand. During this movement the safety on your weapon, if it has one, is disengaged.

The movement of the supporting hand to the firing hand is not a lazy, curvy move. It is done sharply. Think of it this

way: The firing hand and arm, when thrust forward, is like a boxer throwing a jab. There is no curve to it, no bowling-like move. When the supporting hand comes up to meet the firing hand at the beginning of the move they should meet with authority and a slight clap heard when they do meet. Throughout this move the trigger finger remains alongside the frame away from the trigger.

Your firing arm elbow should have a slight bend to it. It should be a bit relaxed. The elbow should be pointed down with just a slight outward angle. If you lock out the elbow with a straight arm on the firing side you, will not be able to get a solid, unwavering sight picture. Your barrel will quiver in the least, which will throw any bullets off your desired target. The elbow of the supporting arm will have a pronounced bend with the elbow pointing straight down. Neither of the elbows is pushed out from the body. Rather, both are relatively tight to the body.

Your eyes are focused on the front sight, placing the sight center mass on the target. To put it simply, you are dead serious at this point.



Let's review where we are. We've established a grip high on the tang of the weapon. The weapon was brought up to a position close in to the body with the barrel pointed towards the target and the firing elbow tucked into the body and the firing shoulder dropped just a bit. From there the weapon was thrust forward towards the target while at the same time the supporting hand comes up and meets the firing hand with the supporting hand fingers overlapping. You are focused on the front sight and on the target and you mean business.

The next step in the grip is the meat of the matter. You can mess up any of the initial steps and while you will be compromised in one way or another, you can still be effective if this next step is done with precision. You must take that quiver out of the barrel. This is the accuracy step. Everything else is the presentation leading up to the accuracy.

Now you must match the tension that your supporting hand and your firing hand are applying to the tang of the weapon. The tension on your

firing hand will be that of a push. On the supporting hand the tension is a pull.

Your firing hand will be applying the push tension, pushing the weapon away from you, with the base of the palm where it meets the backside of the tang. Your supporting hand will be applying the pull tension, pulling the weapon back into your body, with the fingers wrapped over the firing hand fingers on the front of the tang. These must be equal because if they are not your bullets will not find their desired place on the target. They will go low if the push is greater, or go high if the pull is greater.

This is an exercise in isometrics. The force is applied on both sides equally, thereby creating a stable object, in this case, a stable handgun. It is this stability that leads to your bullet leaving the gun and reaching its desired target.

At this stage your trigger finger remains alongside the frame when in the ready to fire position or mode. It is a simple thing to drop the finger to the trigger and take up the slack, when in the point-and-shoot mode.

No matter if you are firing from a sitting position, like from behind a desk or sitting up in bed, or from a standing position, this basic grip will be a deadly asset to master. The grip, when done properly, is stable. When coupled with the precise presentation just covered, it is a lethal combination.

When you learn this basic grip and presentation to the point that the mechanics become second nature from regular practice there will be only one conscious thought left. That one conscious thought and decision is whether or not to terminally complete the trigger break and send that bullet off to meet its target. That is the only thought or concern you want to have running around inside your head when the time comes. It's the only one you can afford to have.

## ***Nightstands, Desks and the Like***

You know the grip, you know the presentation. Now, just where in that desk or in that nightstand are you going to place your weapon? The care you take with that answer, and the care

you take to make your decision a lasting one is vital.

First off there are not two or three good choices. There is only one. What works for me isn't necessarily the best for you. Before you decide on the where part of the equation you need to take extra care to ensure that the where, except for the handgun, is sterile.

Here are a few things to consider. Your handgun will be loaded, or the magazine holding the bullets will be filled and next to the gun. You will need to ensure that when the time comes the gun, and the ammunition-filled magazine if the gun is not loaded, is easy to reach with nothing in the way.

This means that nothing else should be in that desk or night stand drawer. Nothing—no papers or pens, no loose change, no loose ammunition. Nothing but the gun. It must be in a ready-to-fire state and you must be able to get to it without fumbling through a bunch of junk.

If you are just now going out to purchase a desk or night stand you are in luck because you can ensure that the “gun drawer” is at the front of the decision making process. If you already own one, then you are going to have to empty the drawer chosen as the gun drawer and put the junk in other places. Assuming a right-handed shooter, the desk drawer should be on the right as well.

How you place the gun in the drawer is also vitally important to your quick access to it when the need arises. It must be placed in the exact same place each time. Front or back is up to you, but keep in mind that when you open the drawer there is going to be a chance for that gun to move.

In a desk drawer, by keeping the gun in the far right, front corner you have two sides of the drawer to stabilize the gun in

position. The grip should be closest to you with the barrel pointing directly to the right. The magazine well, or butt of the handgun's tang should be snugged up along the front edge of the drawer. Placing it here affords a more natural angle to gain access to the gun. There are no hard corners to bend your arms or wrists around, just a smooth outstretch of the firing arm and the gun will be in a secure grip in your hand ready to be used.

In a nightstand the placement of the gun remains to the far right, front corner of the drawer. The magazine well or butt still remains closest to you but this time the barrel is snugged up against the front edge of the drawer. Why the difference?

When pulling out a desk drawer it is natural to pull with the firing hand, the hand on the same side as the drawer. In a nightstand, particularly after you've been become suddenly startled, it is a natural tendency to roll over and open the drawer with your left hand. As you'll be somewhere between lying down in bed and sitting up in bed, placing the gun in this way provides a more natural access.

Keep in my mind here that nothing works for everyone in gun placement. What matters most is to keep your gun stored and ready so YOU can get access quickly and naturally. Try a number of placements until you find the one that works for you. When you do make sure each time you put the gun into its drawer it is in the exact place every time.

## ***Purses and Handbags***

With purses and handbags the discussion about the clutter inside becomes possibly more vital than the discussion about the clutter in drawers. There are

going to be other items in the purse or handbag than the gun. You must deal with that fact from the start.

True, there are special holsters that are made to clip inside these things but that still doesn't overcome the ease of access problem. Even a holster securely clipped to the inside of a purse doesn't make access easy if assorted stuff is in the way on your way to secure the handgun. You can't afford the time involved in rearranging that stuff when faced with an ugly situation. You need free and easy access now.

No matter the style of purse, the most logical place to store the gun is at the front. The barrel should pointed down with the barrel snugged into the front edge and the tang extending back along the top. With a purse holster this is a relatively easy thing to do. If you don't own a holster then take the purse to a shoemaker or seamstress and have them sew in an extra triangle-shaped pocket that coincides with your gun's dimensions. Make sure the pocket sits right up to the top edge of the purse as you don't want anything to get jostled around and find its way on top of the tang thereby blocking your grip.

It should go without saying but nothing else goes into that special pocket but the gun. Ever. Like with the discussion about drawers, you'll have to find the best way to draw the gun out of the purse. You also must decide what style is best for you.

Are you going to use the supporting hand to grip the bag while the firing hand unzips or unbuckles the purse and then grip the gun? Is a zipper or buckle the best purse style or is one of those clam-shell types, the ones with a simple toggle at the top that, when undone, causes the purse to open on its own. The choice here is obviously yours,



but keep in mind that the choice to complete the trigger break is yours, too. Like most every thing when it comes to personal defense, the more exact you are, the more exact and precise your practice makes you, the better off you are. Seconds, or even their mere fractions, often count.

## ***What About Those Feet?***

We're talking about stance here, how you are going to place your feet and your body when you need to.

One of the best, and easiest stances to master is the modified

Weaver stance. Basically this stance is one just shy of parallel to the threat or target. Your supporting side foot becomes the front foot. Your firing side foot becomes the trail foot.

Imagine a 30-degree angle cut back from the parallel firing line on a range, or back from parallel from an attacker. Your feet should be aligned along that 30-degree angle, as should your lower body up to the waist. From your waist you slightly turn your firing side shoulder into the target. The jab-like movement you make when you bring the gun up from alongside your body and the clapping of your supporting to complete the grip in the ready position will make this turn naturally for you.

While it is true that this stance does give any attacker a larger profile than a perpendicular stance would, a perpendicular stance is not at all stable. Much more than 30 degrees off parallel and your firing arm will become fully extended making it unstable. Much less, and the unstable body part becomes the supporting arm and sometimes even the firing arm.

Thirty degrees is a magic number here. Initially it will feel more than a little uncomfortable. After a few hours of practice it will become second nature.

In fact, everything we've discussed in this chapter will become second nature with enough practice. It needs to be second nature if you want to be pro-active in your own personal defense. As the name implies, it is personal, as in YOUR defense. How you prepare for it can mean the difference between successful defense and, if you live through it, an episode you rather not remember. If you haven't read the chapter on dry practice now would be a good time. ❁

# The Alpha and Omega: Complete Training

Yes, except for those convicted of felonies, or those with a history of mental illness and a few other qualifiers, everyone else in the United States of America has the right to own a firearm. With some states there are a few more hoops to jump through, particularly with handguns, but thanks in large part to a vigorous defense of the 2nd Amendment the rest of have the right to keep and bear arms.

Without getting into a debate over something in which I have a deep and abiding belief, The Bill of Rights in all its glory, let me say this: Just because you have the right doesn't free you from the responsibility that goes along with exercising that right. I can think of no other freedom we have, that of owning firearms, that bears such a weighty responsibility. That beautifully simple freedom gives us the tool to take a life.

Nay-sayers to this belief would have us believe that guns kill people. Most of us would say that people kill people. Recently, while at the Front Sight Firearms Training Institute near Las Vegas I came to realize that both are rather trite. At Front Sight they have a saying that goes something like this: You are the weapon, the gun is the tool. It may be an exaggeration to say that seeing it put this way was an epiphany, but it was damn close. So close that it still sits at the forefront of my personal defensive posture. I am, you are, the weapon.

## *The Importance of Complete Training*

Just as you wouldn't want a 16-year-old kid to climb into a motor vehicle and take off down the highway without first going through structured training that includes a test of some sort, you

probably also do not want any Tom, Dick, or Harry to go out, buy a gun and start carrying that gun concealed or blasting away without some sort of instruction. Preferably structured instruction rather than a single lesson from Uncle Joe or even the relatively simplistic training that is required by most states in order to get a carry permit.

And, no, definitely not, this is not to step on the 2nd Amendment. It is most certainly the realization that there are deadly serious responsibilities that go along with that right.

These responsibilities don't have an ending point. If you ever have to launch a bullet at an attacker and the attacker falls, well, your responsibilities and their consequences have just begun. They do have a beginning, however. It is the responsibility of making the decision to use lethal force, or not to use lethal force, if and when the time comes. From that first thoughtful decision to the bullet being launched and beyond, is complete training.

The mechanics involved in taking up the trigger slack, experiencing the surprise break in the trigger releasing the hammer or firing pin onto the primer and launching the bullet is basic. The thought process leading up to that point is most likely the most advanced mental gymnastics you'll ever deal with. Complete training takes all of this, the mental and the physical, into consideration. It trains both



the mind and the body to work in concert with one another to create an effective tool. It also asks the most important question you'll ever ask yourself right at the beginning.

Complete training trains the mind along with the body to function as one. Two-day courses, four-day courses and even longer should include both the mind and the body. You should, in choosing a course of instruction, make sure that both are covered. If one aspect is missing, and generally it is the mental part that will be missing, you are not training completely.

In writing his book, *Men Against Fire*, S.L.A. Marshall studied and personally researched all sorts of things that happen to men on the battlefield. One of the things he was able to document had to do with soldiers firing their weapons. It seems that barely 15 percent of those under fire would actually return fire at enemy personnel or positions. Even in the best-trained units that percentage was not more than 25 percent — one in four. That's right, the rest didn't fire back. At all.

Keep in mind that the men involved were under fire. Their buddies were getting killed. Their lives were in severe danger. They had the legal sanction of war to fire back without threat of civil or criminal repercussion. And the vast majority didn't shoot back. Certainly fear was a factor but there was another factor, too. This leads us to the question.

## ***The Ultimate Question, The Ultimate Consequence***

Are you prepared, willing and able to use deadly force to stop a robbery or an assault in your home or where you work? How

about a rape? What about an attacker preying on you, a family member, or someone you don't even know in the park?

If you own a gun then you certainly have the ability. If you have been well trained to use that gun then you are prepared. That leaves us with "willing." So, let's ask again, "Are you willing to use deadly force in situations like this?"

There is no single correct answer. The willing part of the question is a question on morals and ethics. How you answer these questions is purely personal, based on your moral and ethical beliefs. Morals are generally a personal reflection on right and wrong. Ethics are based collectively on the area you live in and coincide with generally accepted conduct.

In a course of complete instruction where should this question be raised? The answer is quite simple — right at the beginning. A course that doesn't ask this question in a serious manner is simply a course in handling firearms, not a personal defense course. Without a solid answer to the different scenarios you will not be properly prepared to defend yourself or your loved ones when the time comes.

At the Front Sight Firearms Training Institute the instructors ran us through a variety of scenarios in the classroom. They ranged from an attacker who wouldn't stop, to a roadside accident where one of the drivers became an aggressor. In each we were asked when or if we would present the handgun and when we would shoot. In more than one case the aggressor became the victor thanks to hesitation on the defender's part, hesitation in answering that question.

That's why your answer to the ultimate question is so important and why it must be asked early on during your personal defense training. Knowing the answer to the question when posed in different ways gives you the prior knowledge that you will act in a specific way. There will be no hesitation. You already know the answer.

Your training course also needs to go over the ramifications of what will happen to you if you are forced to use lethal force to stop an assailant. There are a myriad of civil and criminal liabilities to consider. You quite possibly will be cuffed and arrested. Legal costs in defending yourself against a



criminal complaint filed by the District Attorney and/or a civil liability case where the attacker's family sues you are a definite possibility. So is being pilloried in the press for acting in what they will call a "rash" manner. These are just a few of the consequences of your actions in a justified shooting.

When you know that you are willing to take the ultimate action in defending yourself or your loved ones your training absolutely needs to take the next step. The "when to shoot" question must be asked and answered.

## ***Justification Training***

Going hand-in-hand with the willing part of the equation, any personal defense course you participate in must include a good discussion of when the use of deadly force is justified. We use deadly here for a very specific reason. While you are training with your gun to stop an attacker, not to kill him or her, there is a real probability that when your bullet hits center mass on the assailant that you will, indeed, kill him.

Here's something to keep in mind throughout the discussion. No matter how justified you may feel, no matter how justified you actually are, whether or not it was reasonable or necessary may often rely on what the investigating officers and a jury of 12 may think. In other words the best gunfights, as that is what they are, are the ones you can avoid. Unfortunately there may come a time when avoidance is out of the question.

There are no hard and fast rules any personal defense course can give you to determine with absolute certainty when a shooting will be ruled justified. There is, however, a definite thought process involved that

will make the shoot/don't shoot question easier to answer. This thought process must be in your course for you to be prepared.

Questions that you must be able to answer after the course and when faced with an attacker would include these:

- Was the force used necessary rather than excessive?
- Was the use of force unavoidable?
- Was there an immediate threat rather than an imminent threat?
- Was it a threat to life or serious injury to the body?
- Are you free from any fault, from any instigation or escalation?

Did your attacker have the ability, intent and opportunity to kill you or cause serious injury?

These are just a few of the questions that you need to be trained to quickly think about. In a study by Mike Waidelich in the early 1980s, he found that the average armed assailant can travel just over 20 feet in one and a half seconds and cause a fatal wound. Waidelich also found that it takes that same amount of time for an average person to draw his weapon from his holster and fire one bullet into the center mass of a target. Basically that

means you have precious little time, and you are in immediate danger, when an armed attacker is within a distance of 10 yards. If these considerations aren't in the course you are thinking about signing up for you need to find another.

You should also look for a section of the course to include a thorough discussion on ways to persuade an attacker that his course of action is not all that bright. No, you are not going to become a psychologist here, but you will attempt to quickly persuade the attacker to quit his actions. Your vocal cords come into play here with simple things like yelling, "Don't come any closer," or "Stop! I will shoot," while you are presenting the weapon into the ready-to-shoot position.

At the end of this section of your personal defense course you must be able to positively determine if your shooting in specific situations is justified. If you have to wrestle through the answer you most likely shouldn't be shooting. Nothing is more serious than a gunfight. There are no winners— one side just loses a hell of a lot more. The so-called winner now gets to face the possible wrath of the police and the courts, the press, and

the inner questions and turmoil that will mark the rest of his or her life.

If you don't understand that the best gunfight is the one you avoid then you need to go back and take another course that thoroughly goes through the justification and ramifications of the use of deadly force.

A well-respected lawyer, and someone I hold in high personal regard, Doug Chester, offers these final thoughts on the subject of consequence and justification.

"It's interesting that you hit right on the big question. It is one thing to pull the trigger in a sanctioned situation, i.e., military. Your conscience is given a "free pass," and you have society's sanction (more or less) to terminate another human being," said Chester. "Not that this gets you totally out from under, as you still have to live with yourself, and you still have to wonder if you were right.

"In a non-sanctioned situation, like a burglar breaking into your home, or a street fight, the question is a lot tougher, and you will likely be subject to unsympathetic review. I find it infuriating when people second-guess cops for a split-second decision made in a dark hallway when they were telling some

eggplant to freeze and show his hands, and the eggplant does neither, and points a cell phone at the cops, and gets shot. Boards of inquiry and Courts will spend weeks re-hashing a second by second account of a shooting. This is totally unfair to the cop. It is also what you should expect as a civilian involved in a shooting, only you'll get worse. The problem is that the bad guy is not subject to these limitations. He acts on instinct without consideration of consequences. This gives him a major advantage."

Up until now the course of complete instruction has only touched on the mental process involved in the use of firearms or weapons in self-defense. And that's how the course should be laid out. Mental exercises, the mental debate, are by far the hardest to come to grips with. They are the defining quotient on the use of weapons for personal defense. On the range, with a weapon in hand, the rest of a complete training course becomes simple mechanics.

## ***Weapons Training***

That's not to downplay the importance of the correct way to use a weapon. The weapon is only as good as the person using

it. You need to know your weapon inside and out.

A complete weapons course will start from the beginning, showing how the weapon works and how it is taken care of. It should include a wide range of weapons in various actions as well as barrel lengths and grip sizes and styles. Just because you are a revolver fan doesn't mean it is the best choice for you. Just because that .44 Magnum with the 8-inch barrel is in your gun safe doesn't mean that it the right choice for carrying in a holster or placing in a purse or desk drawer. Only by using different styles will you be able to make a good decision on which one is right for you.

A basic defensive weapons course should start with you and your choice of weapon at short range, say 5 yards. First the instructors should go through the mechanics involved in the grip, stance and presentation of the handgun to the target gaining a good focus on both the front sight and the target. When this is mastered you begin firing two shot groups so that the hits are center mass on a human silhouette. After you reach a high degree of consistency the distance should be increased to seven, then 10 and on out to 25 yards.

Your course should teach you basic malfunction drills. You need to know how to clear a dud from your gun, clear a shell that has mis-fed into the chamber and execute tactical reloading all with the handgun in the point position. These should become reflexive actions, the only intellectual action is whether to actually shoot.

Actions after the shot is taken, checking the surrounding environment for any other threats, needs to be covered. You'll have a single focus after the shot, and that single focus must be broken to ensure the area is clear from danger. Front

Sight uses the quick-check and final check method. It is one that is highly recommended.

After the shot(s) are taken you execute a simple head movement, looking both left and right with the weapon in the ready position. You then execute the final check by taking a step, left or right, and then rotating your head and torso as one, like a tank turret, while keeping the gun in the ready position. This is done after every shooting sequence. You must become reflexive in breaking through that tunnel vision.

A basic two-day course will build upon each technique. It should only go as fast as you can be taught. A rushed course serves no one but the instructor's wallet. What you want to accomplish in a basic course is the fundamentals involved. You want to be able to reflexively get into a firing stance. Reflexively go through the presentation of the weapon from a holster to the point position. Taking the slack out of the trigger, getting the surprise break and the reset of the

trigger without putting the slack back. You need to be able to hit center mass on the target.

Actual speed of presentation and firing, and the speed involved in clearing a malfunction will only become "fast" after a great deal of practice. Another chapter of this book goes through something called "Dry Practice," an excellent method of building speed through regular practice even when you are not on a range. You'll also find a chapter on grip, stance and weapon presentation and placement. Each stresses the reflexive nature of everything except the intellectual decision on whether to shoot or not. Everything except taking the shot must be reflexive and a good course will help get you to that point.

The basic course should also include at least one scenario where you will be shooting at photo targets, or choosing not to shoot in some cases, while inside a mock-up of a house or alley. One instructor should be tied to you for safety one way or another, and another acts as the voice of

the bad guy in the background, screaming and making noise, putting your shoot/don't shoot reasoning to the test.

A more advanced four-day course would start with all of the above but get into even more tactical situations. It should cover shooting from a variety of positions as well as shooting under limited light. Clearing areas such as doorways, around corners, and engaging multiple targets should also be trained. And there should be a wide variety of tactical scenarios that you go through.

In all cases a defensive weapons course, be it handgun, rifle, shotgun or edged weapon, must be a skill-building course. You didn't run before you could first walk, and you won't be good with a weapon until you first learn how it works and how it is to be used effectively in a step-by-step manner.

You say you don't need training? That you have all the bases covered? There is really no such thing as "complete training" as you must continue to train, to practice, to keep your skills sharp and your mind focused. Having the skills leads to confidence and confidence will lead to performance. Skills not practiced and refreshed are soon lost. Complete training means regular and proper training. It just doesn't end. ✪

(Author's note: The mental processes involved in the training for personal defense, along with the need for continued practice on a regular basis, was brought home after attending the Front Sight Firearms Training Institute's two-day Defensive Handgun Training course. Even after a career as an infantry officer where I was trained on all sorts of weapons, qualifying expert in each I might add, I have never been to a more professional course. It, or its four-day counterpart course, is a course I would highly recommend to anyone considering having a defensive weapon in the home or applying for a carry permit.)



# Buying Used Firearms Without Guilt, and With Low Risk

Let's face it, new guns can be expensive. And even though people can make the argument, "What price is your life worth?" when you are buying a gun for personal defense, sooner or later, we all give in to the temptation of a used firearm. You might spot one that you've always wanted. Or one just like the one you learned to shoot with, and foolishly sold because someone offered you "a lot of money" for it. Or, someone has a solid firearm at a rock-bottom price, but there is no time because he is leaving town tomorrow or getting divorced next week.

Yes, it could be a great deal. Or, it could be a series of headaches, each more expensive than the last. How do you avoid the hassles? Firearms transactions occur in one of two

settings; A retail establishment or on the open market. (In states where all transactions must go through a dealer, the open market is the black market. You were warned. Do not write me from jail, bemoaning your fate.)

Dealing with a retail establishment has its own etiquette. The main thing you need to remember is to follow the advice your father gave you when he was trying to get you educated on appliances, vehicles and life insurance: Buy from an established firm that has been around a long time. Yes, you'll pay their markup. But what that markup gets you is their experience and a willingness to stand behind their product. You may be seeing your second-ever (fill in the model name or number) but an active gun shop

will have been at it for years, and likely seen dozens of them.

Ask the store staff what the return policy is. Don't assume there is one, and don't assume it is printed on the back of the receipt. It would be prudent for the store to print it, but a lot don't. You can usually expect to be able to return a firearm if it isn't as promised. If all the particulars check out as presented (correct headspace, straight barrel, clean bore, correct caliber) but the 80-year-old revolver you just bought shoots poorly, that was part of the risk you assumed when you paid \$79 for it.

A firearm should perform within the parameters of its type. If it doesn't, then you should be able to return it. If you buy a Winchester or Marlin saddle carbine, and it shoots two to three inch groups at one hundred yards, you have no cause for complaint. That is the expected average for such rifles. If the group is two feet to the right or left, then you have cause for return.

You can protect yourself in many cases by asking for a test period. In the two weeks following your purchase you should have a gunsmith inspect your new firearm, and test-fire it. If anything is wrong, you can return it within the time limit. (Be sure to get this in writing.) Car dealers do it, dog breeders do it, and many gun dealers also do it.

**How your used gun shoots might have something to do with the ammunition. Try several kinds to see what works best. A used gun in good shape should function with nearly all factory-loaded ammunition.**

When you test, test honestly. Don't assume your new Tactical rifle will shoot sub-MOA groups with the grungy surplus ammo you keep behind the seat of your truck. Give it a fair test and feed it new factory match-grade ammo. If it won't perform, have someone else shoot it. I know we're all good shots, but let a better shot try it if you aren't having any luck. In fact, test any new purchase with factory ammo. Yes, we are all competent and accomplished reloaders, but now is not the time to be using them. Test with factory ammo, ideally with factory ammo that has a track record you are sure of. If you buy a used P-38 because you've always wanted one, and it won't shoot your 9mm reloads at all, where's the blame? You don't know. But if it won't shoot groups with Remington Match 9mm ammo that are smaller than a Volvo, you know the gun is at fault.

On the open market such as at a gun show, you have to keep in mind the Latin phrase *Caveat Emptor*. "Let the buyer beware."

You probably won't be offered a chance to return it, nor will you have a chance to test it and have it inspected. How can you protect yourself when buying a firearm on the open market? Get a written receipt, with a description of the firearm and accessories or features. Get the owner's name and address. If you agree to a return policy, write it on the back of the receipt. Both of you sign it. A receipt so-described is a contract, and with it you can later go to small claims court if you can't get the owner to take it back and return your money.

You can minimize your chances of getting shafted, and stuck with a bad deal, if you give the prospective new purchase a thorough inspection. You can't do a test-fire at the store or gun show (that would put us all in a very bad light) but you can look for the things that alert you to a bad deal.

First, look it over. Does the blueing/Parkerizing/hard chrome have the correct color? A reblued gun will look different than a factory blue job. The best bluers

cannot match what the factory did. It may look better, but a reblue isn't original. If the seller is telling you it is factory-new, but the color is off, you might ask why. Or just put it down and walk on. While you're checking the color, look at the edges and markings. A reblue job entails polishing, and a heavy-handed polisher will leave traces on the markings. You can see them "pulled" or "faded." A pulled marking has the buffing wheels marks dragged from the lettering. A faded marking has the letters partially obliterated. (You can do a lot of the visual inspection without even picking it up.) Do all the parts match in wear? Or is one part obviously newer? Is the blueing evenly worn, or is it worn in spots? Many lever guns have the blueing worn off on the bottom at the balance point, not a cause for concern. Is the stock equally worn? Or does the rifle have new wood and old blueing? Any mismatch is cause for concern and questioning. On rifles and shotguns, look over the stock. More than dents and dings (which can be treated later) you're interested in cracks and repairs. Look at the wrist of the stock, behind the tang. Is it cracked? If it is it won't shoot accurately, and probably will crack further when you shoot it. Look at the forend. Does the forend of a shotgun come off easily, too easily? Does it need to be wrestled off? Too easy and wrestling are bad signs. On rifles look at the barrel channel. Some shooters cannot help themselves, they must experiment. If someone has "free-floated" the barrel by way of a wood rasp and router, you've got to wonder what else they did. On handguns, look for dents and dings on the edges and muzzle. Dropped handguns often leave distinct marks from their fall and impact. Dropped guns can

be subtly damaged, and not ever be accurate again. Once your potential new gun passes the visual inspection, check the function. Does the bolt, lever, or operating rod move smoothly and freely? Does the safety click on and off? Does the safety actually prevent the mechanism from firing when it is on? What, the owner won't let you cycle the action or dry-fire it? Put it down and walk away. Yes, I know that many owners and dealers at gun shows want to keep their firearms from being excessively handled. Yes, I know that constant handling can wear blue and put dings in the stock. But if I'm in the market to buy something and the current owner won't let me perform safety and function tests, I walk on. I don't need the financial risk, and I've wasted too much time in the past trying to change small minds.

Having said that, would I make exceptions? Perhaps. But only if I was dealing with

someone with a known reputation, and I had the return policy in writing.

Open the action and look down the bore. Rifle, shotgun, handgun, they all have to have a clean and unpitted bore to shoot well. If the bore is shiny but slick, get a rod and patch to wipe it out. A pitted bore can be disguised by putting a heavy application of oil in it, and then carefully wiping the bore until the pits are hidden but the rifling (if any) shows. Don't put too much faith in bore scopes. Unless the barrel you are looking at is a top-grade match tube, with few rounds through it, the bore will look bad when magnified 10 or 25 times. A rifle with a slightly pitted bore may still shoot well (I have several that do) but you won't know until you test it. If you can't test and return, pass on the deal.

If it can be disassembled without using tools, then strip it. Look the parts over and see if they are matching in color, texture and wear. If you're

contemplating buying a recently shipped M1 Garand that came from the CMP, you probably won't find a lot of matching parts. But, you can ask to see the CMP papers.

If you're buying a new or used AR-15, then you'll definitely want to open it up and see if there are any M-16 parts that have slipped in. (Some shooters don't know the difference, and install whatever works or is cheapest.) Inspect the internals for tool marks and ground-on parts. Many shooters who have tried to assemble an AR ended up doing a lot of grinding and filing. If the receivers or barrel are altered, pass on it. Look at the front sight casting to see if you can spot any hammer marks. If someone took the sight off, they were probably up to no good. If the internal parts are ground-on, whittle the price down by their replacement costs.

Manufacturers who ship assembled AR's make sure the upper and lower match in color. If the AR you're looking at is two different colors, it is probably a parts gun. Be extra careful.

On self-loading pistols in general, check to make sure the magazine goes in smoothly and without binding. Then see that it falls out under its own weight when you push the mag release button. Some won't, like Glocks with early magazines or S&W's or Browning Hi Powers with magazine disconnectors. Does the magazine lock the slide open? Rack the slide and find out. Does the safety work? If it is a hammer-drop model, does the hammer drop? Drop a pencil down the bore, eraser end first, point it up and safety-drop the hammer again. While the pencil jiggles from the vibration, it shouldn't be launched. If it does, the safety isn't blocking the firing pin. Don't worry too much about slide to frame fit. On most guns a bit of play is no big deal.

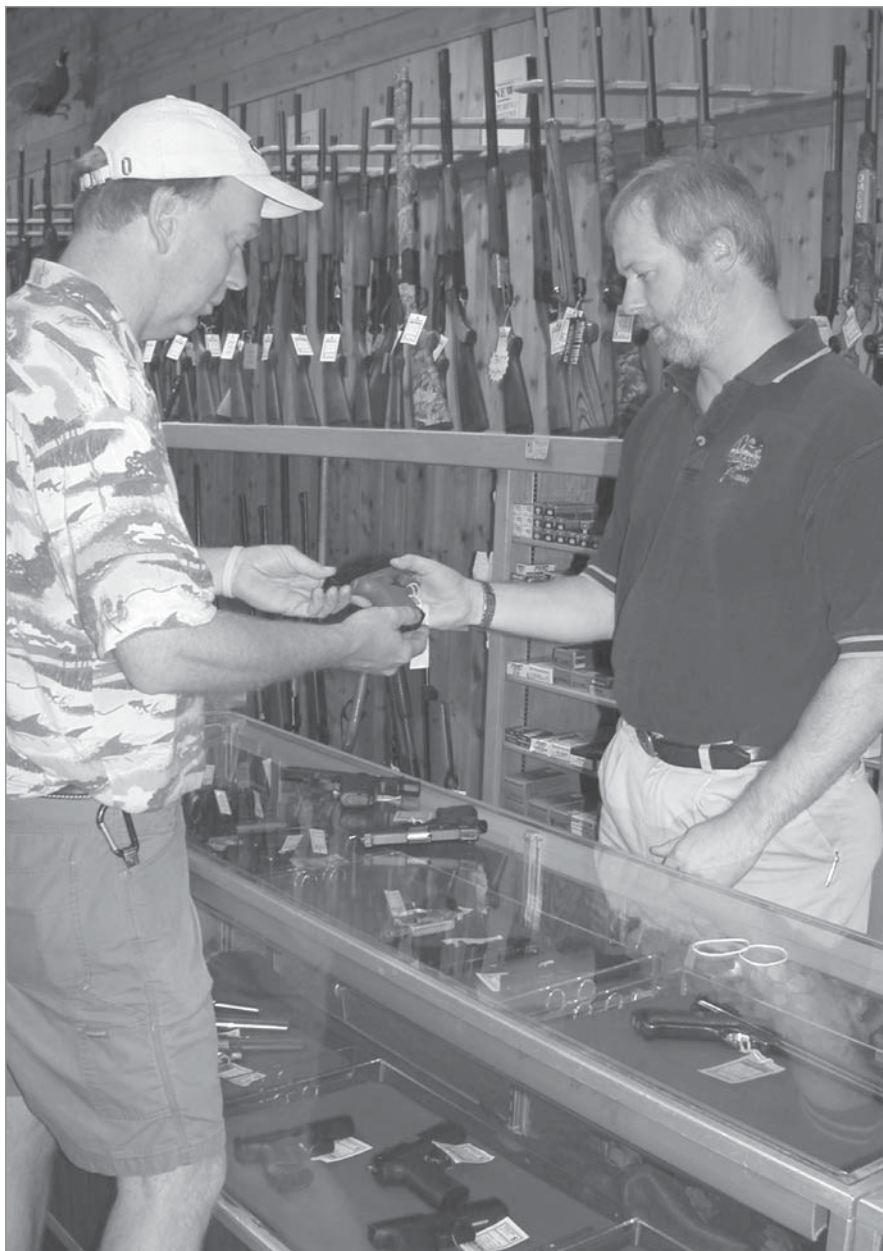
However, if the gun in question is offered as a high-end custom gun “with a few mags through it” and the slide wobbles on the frame, don’t buy it. The choices are all bad: it may not be custom, it may have a lot more ammo through it, or it may be someone’s first “custom” work.

What to look for on 1911’s could take a whole book. Make sure the safeties work and that the bore isn’t pitted. Remove the barrel and look at the lugs. They should be sharp and clean, with square edges and not be peened. If they are peened, the pistol probably needs a new slide and barrel, an expensive repair. If you’re contemplating buying a used 1911 that has been a competition gun, check the grip safety. Many old competition guns have the grip safety pinned or deactivated.

On revolvers, check to see that the cylinder turns smoothly. Slowly cock the hammer for each chamber, watching the cylinder. On each chamber, the cylinder should come fully into position when the hammer is cocked. Failure to “carry up” is a sign of hard use, and will need to be repaired. It can mean simply a new hand, or some minor extractor star work, or it could mean a new hand and extractor. If it won’t carry up, open and look at the extractor. If it has been filed or ground on, pass on it. Grab the cylinder with your off hand and try to move it fore and aft. If it moves more than a few thousandths, it has endshake. Endshake is another bad sign, and will have to be dealt with by a gunsmith by stretching the crane or installing bushing washers. Look at the forcing cone. Is it clean and sharp, or dark and eroded? A heavily eroded forcing cone can be corrected by setting the barrel back, but it takes a skilled gunsmith or a bit of practice to do it right.

So how do you gain all this knowledge so you can assess a firearm? Read. Talk to experienced shooters and collectors. Ask questions. Cruise the gun shows and look at hundreds of guns. Strike up a relationship with a local gun shop, and drop in once a week or so to see what’s new. If you want to get into a particular area of collecting or competition, then read up on it. Yes, it can be

expensive to buy a couple of hundred dollars worth of books to read, but you could lose that and more on one bad acquisition. Talk to the experienced shooters and long-time collectors at your gun club. And as with any other gambling, don’t play with money you can’t afford to lose. Keep at it long enough and you’ll make a mistake or two, but even a bad used gun is knowledge gained. ❖

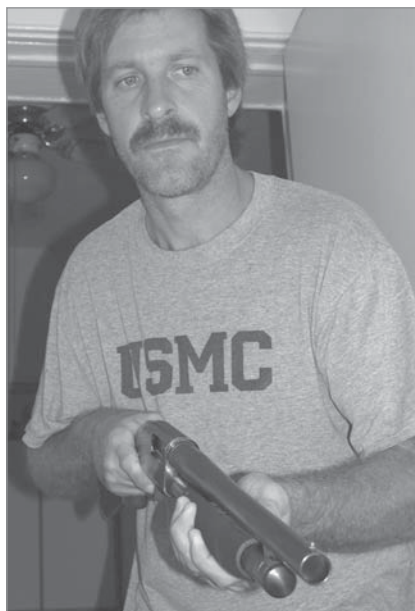

# Bring Out the Big Guns

Let's face it – There are few things available to the average U.S. citizen that can prove as intimidating in a threatening or hostile situation as can a shotgun. There's just something about staring down that black, bottomless, manhole-sized abyss that is a 12-gauge muzzle – I've looked while cleaning, not while on the receiving end, mind you – that quite completely defines the word *fear*. Combine that with the unmistakable *schlick-schlick* sound of a pump-gun action being worked in the darkness, and even the legendary strongman, Hercules, might think twice about stepping, uninvited, inside the doorway.

And as if sight and sound weren't enough, there's the fact that while the man with the .32 ACP is shooting a single round with each pull of the trigger, he who carries a 12-bore filled with 2.75-inch shotshells containing OO buckshot can be secure in the knowledge that nine – NINE – of the same sized projectiles are headed downrange. Downsize to #4 buck in the same 2.75-inch shotshell, and he's increased that count to 27 .24-caliber pellets, each moving at roughly 1,300 feet-per-second (fps). That, my friend, is real power.

Despite these very obvious advantages, the shotgun as a self-defense firearm is not without its downsides. Let's take a look at the pros and cons.

## ***Shotguns – The good***

Let's discuss three factors why a shotgun might be considered for self-defense: Intimidation, Ease of Operation, and Margin of Error.

As mentioned before, there's just something intimidating about having a shotgun pointed at you, and often a 12-bore show of force has proved sufficient to end the threat before the situation has a chance to escalate. That's not to say that you should assume that the mere sight of a shotgun will be enough to strike fear into the heart of any burglar or would-be assailant. In such situations, you should never assume anything; however, instances where the

sight a home or shop owner armed with a 12-gauge has squelched an attack are numerous to the point of justifying the shotgun's role as Intimidator.

Ease of Operation means just that, that a shotgun can be an extremely simple machine to operate. And in a hostile situation simplicity can mean the difference between winning and losing. I say *can be* simple because a shotgun, like many other things, offers varying degrees of technological function – a point which will be discussed further in the section on Choosing an Action.

Finally, there is Margin of Error. With its multiple projectiles per round, the shotgun is may compensate for a number of variables, including fear, injury, target obstruction, target motion, and shooter movement. Any one of these could lead to inaccuracy and a delay or failure in subduing the threat. This element known as Margin of Error, when combined with the Intimidation Factor, can and often does contribute to a sense of confidence on the part of the defender or intended victim, and confidence is the first step to success and effectiveness. But simply having a margin of error does not mean to imply one does not have to aim a shotgun. Nor does it mean you should be firing rounds without positively identifying your target. A shotgun is a lethal weapon and all the same rules apply.



## ***Shotguns – The not-so-good***

On the downside, those who choose a shotgun for self-defense must deal with several factors limiting the gun's effectiveness. These include: Intimidation, Bulk and Recoil, and Ammunition Capacity.

In much the same way as a shotgun can be intimidating to a potential threat, the firearm can likewise be intimidating to the shooter. Shotguns are large, much larger than any pistol, and they kick hard. That can lead to a sense of reluctance; though, conversely, the sheer size of most shotgun ammunition can also contribute to a sense of security. It's a double-edged sword there.

We've mentioned that shotguns are by nature much larger than handguns, and herein lies another consideration – bulk. In close quarters, shotguns, even short-barreled weapons, can prove cumbersome and unwieldy. This is particularly true for smaller-framed shooters. And unlike pistols that can, if necessary, be fired one-handed, shotguns are, save for extreme situations, a two-handed proposition. Ordinarily, this one-hand versus two-hands debate isn't a consideration where shotguns are concerned; however, there is that one time in a thousand – an injury, perhaps – where a single paw is all that's available. There is, also, the concealment factor. My personal home-defense shotgun, a Mossberg Model 500, measures, with 18-inch barrel, 38 inches overall, which is fine given the weapon spends most of its time perched in a corner. Compare this measurement, however, to the .45 caliber Glock Model G20's overall 7.5 inches, and it's easy to see – literally – what the shotgun lacks as a choice for concealed carry.

Along with the potential of being cumbersome, there's also a shotgun's recoil to be considered. True, this recoil is likely to be dismissed entirely in a life-threatening situation; however, it still does exist. And then there's the recoil associated with familiarizing oneself with the self-defense shotgun. Should recoil be an issue, there is the option of downsizing and/or customizing the shotgun so as to make it more user-friendly. These alterations might include choosing a .410-caliber or 20-gauge weapon as opposed to a 12-gauge, using reduced-recoil ammunition, or installing recoil-reducing elements such as pads or barrel ports.

A final thought – and I hesitate to include this in a section on Cons – involves shotguns and ammunition capacity. High-capacity semi-auto handguns, depending upon the caliber, can offer the shooter from 10 to in some cases, 17 rounds. Shotguns, on the other hand, will range from the single shot's solitary offering upwards of six to eight rounds in most traditional (non-custom) weapons; extended magazine tubes can increase this 8-round maximum by a round or two. Initially, the balance in terms of ammunition capacity

seems to swing in favor of the semi-automatic pistol; however, when one considers that each of a 12-gauge pump's six 2.75-inch shotshells are filled with nine .32-caliber #00 pellets – That's 54 individual .32-caliber projectiles – a slightly different picture begins to unfold. That explained, do the pump-gun's six rounds put the shotgunner at a disadvantage in a threatening situation? That may be open for debate.

## ***Gauge or caliber***

For many individuals, this is point at which the debate begins. A 12-gauge, some say, is too heavy and, therefore, too unwieldy. Others counter, there is the intimidation factor is huge. Throw in discussions on customized guns and aftermarket add-ons and the 12-gauge sometimes seems to have very few drawbacks.

On the other side of the coin, there are those who condemn the smaller gauges – the 20-gauge and the .410-caliber – as being less than perfect based on such variables as pellet count and, in the case of the .410, the availability of factory-loaded ammunition designed for self-defense. Still, these “small” guns do have their advocates – those

who would say that gauge, which essentially translates into pellet count, plays a minor role in the case of a shotgun being used in self-defense given that such situations, particularly those encountered in the home, are occurring at extremely close distances – 10 feet or less, on average.

For those considering shotguns, the choices include –

The 12-gauge – Perhaps the most popular gauge in home or self-defense shotguns due in large part to the availability of both guns and specialty ammunition. The 12-gauge is available in all four actions – single, double, pump, and semi-auto – and in a wide variety of price ranges. Barrels, too, are widely available. An excellent choice.

The 16- and 28-gauges – I mention these simply so as not to exclude them; however, neither the 16- nor the 28-gauge get much call in terms of self-defense weaponry. The shotguns can prove rather expensive and somewhat difficult to procure. Likewise, the ammunition, which, when found, is typically better suited for the upland bird hunter than the individual protecting his or her home.

The 20-gauge – A good choice, particularly if the firearm is to be used in the home. The 20-gauge is light, widely available, and produces less recoil than the 12-gauge. Like the 12, specialty (factory-loaded) ammunition for the 20-gauge can be had, and it does lend itself well to handloading.

The .410 caliber – Some would say the .410 caliber is too small to serve well as a self-defense firearm, and that its 11/16-ounce maximum shot charge is far too light to allow for a sufficient number of the larger (#4 Buck and up) pellets. However, that same 11/16-ounce load **does** hold a more-than-adequate number of

#4 or #5 pellets, which will prove effective in a close-quarters situation. An accurately fired .410 round is potent. Maybe not as potent as a 12-gauge, but four pellets of 00 buck will make an impact on someone bent on doing evil. Though not nearly as common as either the 12-gauge or 20-gauge, .410 caliber shotguns are offered by several manufacturers, and in all five (including a lever action) action styles. Of the three most popular gauges/calibers, the .410 produces the least amount of recoil, and can be easily handled by most shooters. The bottom line? It's worth considering.

### Action

Ease of operation, ammunition capacity, and personal preference help determine what type of shotgun action is *best* in the case of the home or self-defense shotgun. Regardless of the action chosen, however, familiarity with the firearm **before** a situation presents itself is paramount. That point cannot be over-emphasized.

**Single-shot** – Probably the least common type of shotgun action for home or self-defense is the single-shot. Recoil, particularly in the larger (12-gauge or 10-gauge) bores, can be considerable; however, it's the one-shot limitation that potential buyers find most undesirable. Add to this the need to cock the single-shot's hammer – a simple act on the range, but potentially troublesome in a darkened hallway when confronted adrenaline levels make fine motor skills difficult – and the single-shot becomes less and less an option. Specialty single-shots, however, are available. The Harrington & Richardson synthetic stocked *Tamer* single comes in a 20-inch barreled .410 version, while the H & R Topper series includes a 12- and 20-

gauge, as well as a .410, with a choice of 26 or 28-inch barrels. New England Firearms also offers a single-shot in their *Survivor Series*, available in 12- and 20-gauge and .410-bore configurations, with a lightweight synthetic stock and choice of 20 or 22-inch barrel. These options are easy on the budget, but if you can afford a different style of gun, you should look for one.

**Side-by-Side or Over/Under** – These days, save for those wielded by the sheriff in Old Western films, relatively few side-by-side (SxS) shotguns are seen in use or discussed as candidates for self-defense weapons, ousted, I believe, by the popularity, simplicity, and availability of the newer model pump-actions and semi-automatics. It's a shame, too, as the SxS makes for a fine choice for self-defense, despite its two-shot capacity which, the truth be known, isn't that much of a disadvantage as practice can smooth to rapidly the empty-break-load-empty routine. In most cases, the SxS offers a simple-to-operate piece, with an immediate choice in choke constrictions – typically, modified and full – a plus should an outdoors situation present longer distances. In addition, side-by-sides have been traditionally lightweight pieces, offering an ambidextrous top-mounted, and thus convenient, safety. Modern



side-by-sides, such as the *Coach Gun* by Stoeger (12- and 20-gauge and .410, 20-inch barrel, double triggers) are without question a force to be reckoned with.

Years ago, I knew a gentleman who kept a pristine Ruger Red Label 12-gauge over/under (O/U), complete with 26-inch barrels, next to his headboard. It was, as he claimed, the best security blanket that money could buy. And while I certainly don't doubt his claim nor the Ruger's role as metal comforter, it's seldom if ever you find an O/U serving as a self-defense or home defense piece. True, there's very little difference between the SxS and the O/U, save for the barrel configuration, so I attribute this discrepancy to tradition.

**Pump** – The workhorse of the shotgun family, the pump-action or simply, pump, is perhaps the most popular action type for defensive use, and the one with which the general public – thanks, Hollywood – is most familiar. A pump, be it a modern Remington 870 Special Purpose or an older Winchester Model 1897 hammer gun, is a reliable piece, able to withstand the rigors of repeated fire and harsh treatment. Barrels ranging from 18 to 22 inches are available, and stock/fore-end combinations of woods and synthetics are offered. All gauges, 12 through 28, as well as .410-bore, are currently being manufactured, with the 12-gauge and 20-gauge being the most often encountered in the home or field.

An interesting safety note about the pump-action as a defense gun revolves around the fact that such weapons can be stored loaded – that is, the magazine filled to capacity – without a round in the chamber. A shotgun stored as such is much safer should it fall into young and/or untrained hands; however, the same piece can also be readied for action in a split-

second simply by hitting the slide release and working the action and disengaging the safety

A plethora of pump-actions, either ready for home defense use or those easy-to-customize, are being made these days. These include models from Remington (M870 Express), Mossberg (M500), Winchester (The Camp Defender), and Ithaca Model 37.

**Semi-Automatic** – The advantage of the semi-automatic shotgun in a defense role rests in the weapon's rate of fire; that is, a round with every pull of the trigger just as quickly as the trigger can be pulled until the rounds, usually five to seven, are exhausted. The disadvantage, however, is the semi-auto's complicated innards – complicated, that is, in comparison to the less technically advanced pump-action and the downright simple side-by-side. There are simply fewer parts, and thus fewer malfunction potential, with the tried-and-true pump-action.

Also to be considered is the price factor, with semi-autos often costing two to two and one-half times that of a defense-specific pump-action. Pros and cons aside, the final word is that there are semi-autos available – the Remington 1100 and Winchester's Super X2 Practical MK II, for example – for those who might want them.

## ***Barrel length and choke selection***

In its simplest form, a shotgun barrel serves merely as a sighting plane. The longer the barrel, the longer the sighting plane. Take away, then, the need for this sighting plane, such as would be the case in a close-quarters defensive encounter, and this lengthy sighting plane becomes unnecessary. A constriction at the shotgun's muzzle, also known as a choke or

choke tube, works to create or maintain pattern density. And pattern density is most vital in those instances where distances from the shooter to the intended target begin to increase; that is, a full choke, or a choke that places a minimum of 85 percent of a shotshell's available pellets within a 30-inch circle at 40 yards, is a moot point at 10 feet, yet becomes an important factor at, say, 100 feet.

Given these explanations and knowing that most self or home defense situations unfold at ranges between 3 and 15 feet from the shooter, it becomes understandable that the defensive shotgun would need neither a lengthy barrel *nor* any degree of barrel constriction/choke. In terms of barrels, a short barrel – a tube ranging from the 18-inch legal minimum up to 22 inches – is both lighter and more maneuverable in tight quarters. Chokes in such barrels are typically fixed; that is, there are no interchangeable choke tubes to deal with. These chokes are commonly referred to as *open*, *improved cylinder*, *spreader*, or simply, *none*. Such constrictions offer acceptable up-close patterns with a variety of shot sizes ranging from #00 Buck to #4 lead, and are the recommended chokes when using specialty or less-than-lethal ammunition.

## ***Shotshells, shot size, and less-than-lethal ammunition***

In the case of shotguns and personal defense, it is shot size more so than shotshell dimension that lends itself to debate. Members of the "One shot and out of commission" group have their valid argument with larger projectiles - #00 Buck, for example – while there are those who would say that

smaller pellets such as #2 or #4 lead have energy and penetration sufficient to stop any threat while at the same time posing a less-than-great likelihood of collateral damage to innocents in adjoining rooms. This debate goes on and on and will not likely be ended here.

Both schools have their points; however, let's begin with shotshell dimension. Even in those shotguns chambered for either 3-inch or 3.5-inch rounds, there is really no need for anything larger than the traditional 2 3/4 -inch shotshell be used in a defense role. Such 2.75-inch rounds offer satisfactory pellet counts – 12-gauge = nine #00 Buck pellets, 27 #4 Buck, pellets or roughly 200 #4 lead – while keeping recoil to a minimum. These smaller rounds also allow for increased magazine capacity. An exception to this may be when considering 20-gauge firearms. Here, the choice of a 3-inch shotshell, one which closer approximates a 12-gauge in hull capacity, would be advised.

As for shot size, the scales, both from a private as well as a law enforcement standpoint, seem to swing toward the larger pellets – the #00 Buck and #4 Buck. The thinking here follows that should a shooting situation become unavoidable, you want the threat neutralized quickly and completely; that is, without an opportunity for return fire. In close-range encounters, the nine

and 27 pellets, respectively, of the aforementioned buckshot rounds provide an excellent chance for multiple hits on target, particularly in the case of the #4 Buck, along with more than adequate retained energy and penetration.

Furthermore, and even at close ranges, the nine #00 Buck pellets do disperse wider than do their smaller counterparts, thus adding to a margin of error on the side of the shooter.

The argument in favor of smaller pellets - #2 or #4 lead, for example – centers primarily on these pellets being less likely to cause collateral damage. With less mass, and therefore less energy and penetration, these smaller projectiles, it's thought by some, perform their task and stop the human threat without

problems of over-penetration. Whereas the larger buckshot pellets can potentially wreck havoc in adjoining rooms, the smaller pellets will more often than not fail to penetrate common interior barriers.

Pellet for pellet, the smaller projectiles simply cannot provide the one-shot stopping power of the larger; that is, a one-pellet hit with .32 caliber #00 Buck will draw considerably more attention than will the same hit with a single .12 caliber #4 lead projectile. At a range of 15 feet and with a pattern roughly the size of a turkey egg, a 1-1/2 ounce charge of #4 lead shot leaves little room for error, whereas the 9-pellet load of #00 Buck is a bit more forgiving... at least for the shooter.

Although primarily a focus of the nation's law enforcement agencies, less-than-lethal (LTL) shotgun ammunition offers an interesting and increasingly effective alternative to traditional shotshells. Currently,

several different types of LTL ammunition are available, including rubber buckshot, large rubber balls (2 per 12-gauge round), .73 caliber rubber slugs, and flexible batons or beanbags. Some, such as Lightfield Ammunition Company's innovative *Super Star* and *Star Lite* "koosh ball" 12-gauge round or the 40-gram Flexible Baton (beanbag) round from MK Ballistics, are meant to be fired directly at a perpetrator. Others like the rubber shot pellets are skipped or bounced onto the target. General consensus among law enforcement officers and self/home defense trainers is that LTL rounds are best used as crowd control, and not in a self or home defense role.

## Accessories

To me, accessorizing and customizing are two different things. Accessories are those things, slings for example, that work to make a firearm more user-friendly. Customizations, on the other hand, serve to make a weapon more functional and more field efficient. Such custom work might involve porting a barrel to reduce recoil, shortening or lengthening a stock, installing a non-traditional stock, mounting specialized optics or sighting devices, or extending a magazine tube thus increasing the weapon's ammunition capacity. These are the nitty-gritty; the accessories... well, they're often the gingerbread.

Still, both have their place in the realm of the self/home defense shotgun. Such accessories and customizations might include:

**Stocks and grips** – For a time, I had a black synthetic pistol grip on the Mossberg Model 500 that I maintain as a home defense firearm. And while it certainly did make the gun

lighter and much smaller, I didn't feel as though I had the same control over the piece as with the original walnut stock. Following some range time, I reversed my decision and reinstalled the original 13 1/4-inch stock. A recoil pad handles the recoil of the 2.75-inch #4 Buck rounds I've chosen, and the firearm, overall, provides me with something very substantial to hold on to.

The choice between a traditional (full-length) stock or a pistol-style grip on a self/home defense shotgun is one primarily based on fit, ability, and personal preference. Today's modern synthetic stocks are extraordinarily durable, not to mention being lightweight. Some, such as Mossberg's Model 590 synthetic, incorporate features such as the company's *Speedfeed Stock*, an altered piece capable of holding and quickly supplying four additional rounds. Traditional wood – often walnut – stocks are also an option, and often make for a less expensive, though just as reliable, piece.

Whereas a full stock offers a solid foundation and can contribute to improved accuracy, pistol-style grips also have their place. As mentioned, these short grips make for a somewhat easier-to-conceal weapon and cut down on the space necessary for storage – underneath a seat or mattress, for instance; however, the recoil of such short weapons can prove problematic or impossible to handle for smaller shooters. The bottom line in the stock versus grip debate rests then, elementally, with the individual. And finally, a hybrid. In the case of Mossberg's *HS (Home Security) .410*, a pistol grip is incorporated into the Model 500 pump-action's fore-end; a traditionally styled though synthetic full stock rounds out the piece. This hybridized fore-end allows for a

much surer, positive hold on that element of the weapon necessary to the firearm's repeated function, and is a definite plus when a shooter's hands are wet, either from rain or, understandably, perspiration.

### Sights and sighting devices

– Sights and self/home defense shotguns are, it seems, a relationship founded on personal preference and application. For the layperson who simply wants a dependable weapon for the purpose of protecting self, home, and property, a single front bead – the traditional shotgunner's sighting device – serves more than admirably. In most instances, the shotgun is pointed rather than aimed, and as such, a single sighting device like a lone front bead, is sufficient.

Military and law enforcement shotguns will often be seen with some type of after-market or customized sighting system; something other than a simple bead. Iron or buckhorn sights are one example, as is the large aperture *Ghost Ring* unit, a modern twist on the traditional peep sight, which allows for quick target acquisition. Laser or lighted sighting units are yet another option; however, and unless a quality unit is going to be purchased and professionally mounted, regularly maintained, and is made familiar through range time, it's advised that the fewer things to consider in the heat of a defense encounter, high-tech sights included, the better.

All in all, a shotgun is a wise choice for personal defense, especially in the home. While the gun can't really be concealed or easily carried, it works especially well if kept at the ready to defend against home invasions. In trained hands, all the elements that make a shotgun effective come to the fore and the gun serves as an outstanding fight-stopper. ❖

# The Trend Toward Autoloaders

The world of the handgunner is surprisingly large; but there are really just two types of defensive handguns – the revolver, and the semi-automatic pistol. Since the mid 1980s there has been a decided shift among law enforcement agencies to adopt autoloaders as their primary weapons. Before 1980 most cops carried revolvers. Many of those revolvers were chambered for the .38 Special. Some fired .357 Magnum rounds. There was a long-held philosophy that revolvers were more dependable, simpler and safer than autoloaders. We can argue the nuances of such thinking for the next 100 pages of text and never satisfy everyone. Things began to change as a result of

several high-profile shootings in which law enforcement officers were quite simply out-gunned. In a couple of those shootings officers died trying to reload their revolvers. Those events started a serious review of handgun policies and training. From the FBI down to local police agencies, the real-world needs of officers on the street were held up to the test of “what if.” It became clear, rather quickly that the benefits of the magazine-fed pistol outweighed any perceived drawbacks. There was a wholesale change in the handgun philosophy of law enforcement officers.

People might not like to admit it, but the official adoption of a firearm by a government agency

can have a big impact on the buying public. The bigger the agency, the bigger the impact. Consider the Beretta Model 92 pistol. Once it was deemed good enough for the U.S. military, it suddenly became good enough for many police agencies and as a result, the general public fell in line. These days, while revolver sales are still holding their own, most people opt for a pistol when it comes time to think about self-defense. Here’s why.

## ***The semi-auto pistol defined***

Semi-automatic as it refers to a handgun means precisely that. In other words, the weapon fires once for each pull of the trigger. At which time the shooter must fully release the trigger and pull it again. This can be done until such a time as the ammunition supply is exhausted. The internal workings of the weapon eject the spent cartridge, slide a fresh cartridge into the chamber under the firing pin, and close the action, thus making the weapon “live” once more. Often, such firearms are, however incorrectly, referred to as *automatics*. Unlike semi-autos, true or *full* automatics require but a single pull of the trigger in order to exhaust the supply of ammunition. The German MP-40, a.k.a. Schmeisser, is an example of such a fully automatic firearm. True, the MP-40 and the Ruger Model P89 are both recoil-



operated *and* fire the same 9x19 round; however, beyond that, the similarities end, particularly when discussing semi-automatic versus true automatic fire.

## ***Why semi-auto: Pros and Cons***

Whether you're talking about a rolling pin or a Rolls Royce, everything short of perfection comes complete with a set of Pros and Cons. Such is the case with the semi-automatic pistol as a defensive firearm. And these variables, then, should be taken into consideration when you're deciding upon the category of firearm – revolver, semi-auto, or shotgun – which will be used in these defensive roles.

### **Pros**

- Most modern semi-autos are relatively simplistic in design and operation
- Intermediate calibers – .380, 9mm, and .357 SIG – provide options for women or seniors
- Large capacity magazines offer seven to 17 rounds
- Reloading is faster and easier than with a revolver
- Modern autoloaders can be safely carried with a round in the chamber
- Several frame sizes are available to fit nearly every hand and every defensive option
- Autoloaders offer a choice of single-action, double-action, and double-action-only

### **Cons**

- Some models may prove cumbersome, bulky, and/or heavy for some shooters
- Heavy recoil springs may cause trouble for some shooters
- Lacking pre-loaded magazines, reloading time

can increase dramatically over revolvers

- The operation of a semi-auto is more complicated than that of a revolver
- Improper ammunition choice or poor maintenance can lead to malfunctions

## ***Large, medium, small, and compact***

Before we delve into the details surrounding the various semi-automatic pistol frames and frame types, it makes sense that we first define this word – *frame* – as it applies to this particular firearm. The *frame is the main structure of the handgun to which the other components, e.g. grips, barrel, slide, trigger group, are attached.* In other words, the frame of the semi-automatic pistol can be compared to the foundation of your home. Construction begins with the foundation – the frame – and then everything is built on top of that.

In the past, the majority of semi-auto frames were constructed of either stamped or machined steel or aluminum. Today, however, an increasing number of these firearms, civilian, military and law enforcement styles, are being built on frames made of high-

tech synthetic polymer materials. Such frames are not only lighter than are their steel or aluminum counterparts, but they are also extremely low maintenance, impervious to changes in temperature, and virtually indestructible. On the *con* side, however, semi-autos sporting polymer frames, being lighter, will also exhibit increased felt recoil than will their heavier, steel-framed counterparts. That said, frame composition becomes a matter of fit, comfort, and recoil-handling ability.

Next is frame size. Modern semi-automatic pistols are offered in five different designations or classifications – large, medium, small, compact, and subcompact. Now, before you start thinking that a *large frame* means a large caliber and a *subcompact* denotes a smaller caliber, let me say that while it can be the case, it isn't necessarily the rule. For instance, 9mm semi-autos are available in large, medium, compact, and subcompact formats. But you can also get a subcompact .45 ACP. It's a handful to shoot, but great to carry. Such choices, then, lend themselves to questions on the part of you, the shooter – What is your physical stature? How large are your hands? To what extent

can you comfortably tolerate recoil? Will the firearm be carried concealed on your person? In a handbag or fanny pack? Or will the weapon be stored in a lockbox or bedside nightstand? The answers to these questions will help you decide which frame size, is best for you. Get to a gun shop or a gun show and handle several different sizes. If you can arrange it, go to the range and see if you can actually shoot some of the different models.

## **Choosing a caliber**

The question of caliber as it relates to semi-automatic pistols used for self-defense can best be answered by asking several different questions. These include:

- Does this caliber deliver enough power so as to be capable of eliminating or disabling any threat immediately, where the key word here is **IMMEDIATELY**
- Is the caliber so large as to be uncomfortable or unwieldy to shoot, thus affecting accuracy
- Does the caliber offer a variety of bullet weights and designs
- Is the primary purpose of this caliber (firearm) to be

home defense, street defense, or will it serve double duty

In the long run, it's Question #1 which carries the most significance, for it's possible to possess a comfortable, accurate handgun lacking the stopping power necessary to eliminate the threat *before* that threat can do you bodily harm. Likewise, it is also possible to possess a firearm fully capable of performing well in a self-defense role which has been mismatched with improper ammunition, thus decreasing or negating the weapon's effectiveness.

With this in mind, let's take a look at a list of popular semi-automatic calibers and cartridges, with an emphasis on bullet weight and design.

### **The .22 Long Rifle (LR)**

While it is undeniable that the venerable .22 rimfire is a joy to shoot, the caliber leaves quite a bit to be desired when it comes to self-defense. The problem? Even with high-velocity rounds leaving the muzzle at more than 1,300 feet per second (fps), the light 40-grain bullet – yes, even in a hollow point format – with their perhaps 150 foot-pounds of point-blank energy just don't have the immediate stopping power

necessary to classify them as a consistent, reliable self-defense bullet. Certainly, the perpetrator may eventually succumb to injuries received courtesy of a .22 LR, but the important term here is *eventually*.

Perhaps the .22 LR might best be used as a training tool on the range, with the intent being to upgrade to a larger caliber for applications either in the home or on the street.

### **The .25 ACP**

There was a period during the early 1980s, I believe, when the tiny .25 ACP semi-auto pistols, particularly those manufactured by Raven Arms, became quite trendy. Why, I'm not certain, as it was my experience that Black Cat firecrackers made just as much noise *and* were, in most cases, as accurate as the .25 ACP.

True, the .25 semi-auto does offer a small variety of bullet weights and designs ranging from a 35-grain jacketed hollow point (JHP) to a 50-grain full metal jacketed (FMJ) round; however, with velocities approximately half of the High Velocity .22 LR and less than 50 percent the energy at the muzzle when compared with the same .22 rimfire, the .25 ACP, again, leaves much to be desired. And in terms of range practice, most would be better served with a mid- to high-end .22 rimfire semi-auto for accuracy, ammunition availability, and ammunition cost.

### **The .32 ACP**

Some shooters consider the .32 ACP the bottom end of the self-defense ammunition curve. Others draw the line at .380. Regardless, the tale of the tape reveals the .32 ACP to have muzzle energy rating (120 to 135 ft/lbs) slightly less than a .22 High Velocity, and bullet weight options which include 60-, 65-,



and 71-grain projectiles. Bullet designs include FMJ, JHP, and Federal's Hydra-Shok round in JHP.

Like the .22 rimfire, the .32 ACP is enjoyable and inexpensive to shoot, both considerations which should lead to individuals spending ample time on the range acquainting themselves intimately with the capabilities and limitations of this borderline self-defense caliber. Range time is vital, particularly with the .32 ACP, as familiarity with the firearm leads to elevated accuracy, which plays a major role in this cartridge's effectiveness or lack thereof.

### **The .380 ACP**

Despite what was said earlier about the .32 ACP and the caliber's potential as a candidate for self-defense, it is with the .380 that many consider to be the least powerful cartridge for use in a self-defense pistol. Bullet weights for this popular caliber range from 85 to 102 grains, with a wide variety of bullet designs including Federal's Hi-Shok and Hydra-Shok JHP, FMJ, Remington's Brass JHP, and the Starfire Hollow Point, a quick-expansion offering from PMC. In comparison, muzzle energies for the .380 will be half again that of the .32 ACP, or from 180 to 200 ft./lbs. This brings the stopping power up to what some people might describe as "adequate" but is it still a long way from the "lightning bolt effect" you'd love to have when your life is on the line.

The .380 is head and shoulders above the .32 ACP in the realm of self-defense, but it's effective use still requires impeccable combat accuracy and perhaps working knowledge of human anatomy. If you know where to place the round and can put it in exactly the right spot, the .380 will work.

### **The 9mm**

By far the world's most popular pistol cartridge, the 9mm, aka 9mm Parabellum or 9mm Luger, has earned itself a self-defense role with police departments, security forces, and private individuals around the globe. Dozens of makes and models of 9mm semi-auto pistols, both foreign and domestic and, of course, of varying quality and dependability, are available. Ammunition, too, is varied, abundant, and relatively inexpensive – a plus on the practice side of the equation. Shooters can choose a 9mm in any frame size and some guns like the Glock and Springfield Armory XD series provide identical controls and nearly identical ergonomics between the smallest and the largest models.

Muzzle energy ratings for the 9mm will run from 290 to 295 ft./lbs. into the high 400s and low 500s, with many manufacturers'

offerings averaging from 325 to 370. On the low end, shooters can choose from a 95-grain Starfire HP from PMC up to several different 147-grain projectiles in configurations including FMJ and FMJ +P, JHP, and JHP +P. Here, the +P denotes a more powerful cartridge and indicates, on average, a 100 to 150 fps increase in muzzle velocity over traditional ammunition of an identical style (bullet weight and design). Bullets designed specifically for self-defense – the aforementioned +P, Federal's *Nyclad* (an encapsulated lead core with a patented nylon coating ensures reliable cycling in semi-autos), and the *MegaShock* (weight retention AND controlled expansion) by Lapua – are also available and might be considered. As previously mentioned, inexpensive FMJ ammunition is widely carried and can be used for familiarization and practice.

Recoil with the 9mm, even with some of the lighter smaller pistols, is still very manageable, even for those with smaller hands. And this decrease in recoil, or increase in controllability, does not necessarily translate into a corresponding decrease in the caliber's effectiveness as a self-defense choice.

### **The .357 SIG**

This is the new kid on the block. Designed by the folks at SIG-Sauer, makers of some of the world's best semi-auto pistols, the .357 SIG was created to duplicate the power of the .357 Magnum in a round that would fit into and function perfectly in an autoloader. Since U.S. police agencies began the wholesale switch to auto-loading pistols in the mid-1980s there have been complaints that the 9mm is underpowered. Lots of law enforcement agencies were also concerned, knowledgeable shooters would say wrongly, that carrying a Model 1911 (with its bigger .45 ACP rounds) in the cocked and locked condition was "dangerous." The search for an alternative yielded the .40 S&W, which will be discussed below. And thus was spawned the .357 SIG, now just a few years old. Several law enforcement agencies have adopted the round and most report that it does indeed deliver the "lightning bolt effect" of the old .357 Magnum wheelgun.

Despite these capabilities, however, the 357 SIG may never enjoy the popularity of the 9mm. The 9mm and the .40 S&W already have the lion's share of the defensive pistol market, especially in the military and law enforcement areas.

Several bullet weights are available for the 357 SIG, with the 124-grain, 125-grain, and 147-grain being three of the more

popular and most versatile options. You can expect sharper recoil as we continue to move up the power scale, but it is not oppressive. Where the .357 SIG really shines is accuracy. There are a couple handgun models on the market that allow the shooter to change from .357 SIG to .40 S&W by simply swapping barrels. The .357 SIG will outshoot the .40 every time.

### **The .40 S&W**

Introduced in 1990, the .40 S&W is quite honestly the product of litigation. To make a long story short, the FBI liked the 10mm, but some agents could not qualify with this monster cartridge and sued to be given a chance to shoot something smaller. When all was said and done, the FBI had to make serious change in policy and ammo companies and gunmakers came up with something to fill in the gap. Since 1990, the .40 S&W has taken the shooting world by storm, especially the area of law enforcement. This round takes up where to some the 9mm leaves off – and then some. Bullet choices for the .40 run the gamut from Federal's 135-grain Hydra-Shok JHP (1,190 fps and 420 ft/lbs at the muzzle) to a number of 180-grain loadings, including several +P rounds

Understandably, recoil will be more noticeable in the .40 S&W as compared to the 9mm; however, the lighter (135 and 150-grain) rounds, themselves proven better performers than the 180-grain offerings, are still quite manageable for all but the most recoil-conscious. You get only a little less power than the venerable .45 ACP and only a few less rounds than can be held by a high-capacity 9mm magazine.

### **The .45 ACP**

Imagine, if you will, getting hit by a half-inch marble going

647 miles per hour. That's the .45 ACP, one of the most recognized and most popular handgun calibers in existence today. Popularity, performance, precision, power, reliability, availability, versatility – the .45 ACP has it all in terms of a self/home defense firearm; however, that's not to say that the tried-and-true .45 isn't without its downsides.

Yes, it is undeniably a powerful piece, yet that power comes with a price in the form of recoil and physical weight; still, and with an eye on firearm design and ammunition selection, both variables – recoil *and* weight – can be kept down to manageable levels for most shooters. Too, the .45 ACP's larger rounds translate into decreased magazine capacity in the smaller guns. – 10 rounds, commonly, for the 9mm and .40 S&W compared to the .45's eight. It is a concern for some, but perhaps not for the civilian masses. And the crafty gun designers are everyday working out ways to stuff the government-limited maximum 10 rounds into small and smaller .45 ACP pistols.

Versatility and variety are but two of the areas in which the .45 ACP excels. The cartridge offers a wide range of bullet weights – factory loads from 165 to 230 grains – and designs, along with an almost infinite number of makes and models from manufacturers worldwide.

## ***Customizing your home/self-defense handgun***

Webster defines the word, *customize*, in this way – To make according to individual specifications. My definition differs slightly, that being "to make so as to be more user-friendly, and in essence, a more



effective or productive piece or whole.” Those definitions stated, let’s take a brief look here at the art of customizing the defensive pistol.

Before we get started, however, let’s consider the case where no customization is needed. Rather, the firearm from an energy/power standpoint meets any and all defense criteria, fits comfortably, and functions properly and reliably. The piece points well, and the recoil is more than manageable given the factory-equipped grips. The out-of-the-box iron sights are large enough to allow for quick target acquisition, but not so big as to be visually obstructive – that, and they perform as well in daylight as they do in low light. Should this be your new semi-auto handgun, my suggestion is this – Don’t mess with it. If you’re already a shooter, practice. If you’re not a skilled shooter, register for a firearms training and concealed carry workshop, pass it with flying colors... and then practice.

Granted, the scenario above is the ultimate. In many cases, an off-the-rack suit – it’s going to need a little alteration here and there. Below are some of the primary ways in which a handgun meant for self/home defense can be made more user-friendly.

**Lights** – Lights as they relate to personal defense and the use of firearms typically take one of two forms, a traditional hand-held flashlight, and a light source, conventional or laser, mounted directly on the weapon.

In most civilian defensive situations, a traditional battery-operated flashlight can prove more than sufficient. Obviously, such a hand-held light should be bright enough to adequately illuminate objects at an anticipated distance, be that the length or breath of an interior

room, or the width of a commercial storage facility. Again, and obviously, batteries should of the highest quality, and should be checked frequently.

And replaced, if necessary

Two variables present themselves when discussing illumination for defense purposes, a.k.a. tactical lighting. The physical weight of the light source is one concern, one which in recent years has been addressed by those manufacturers using technologically advanced – lightweight – polymer materials in the construction of these flashlights. The weight of these modern hand-held lights has decreased, while the light (candlepower) generated has, in many cases, increased dramatically, thanks to improved power sources and better bulb/filament combinations.

NOTE – These modern

lightweight, or rather, *lighter weight* flashlights, like the heavy-duty four-cell and six-cell Mag-Lites®, can also serve as very effective weapons should the situation dictate.

The second consideration is one of inconvenience. Or rather, learning to accurately shoot with one hand while holding a tactical flashlight in the other. Some suggest using a light that offers a thumb-operated pulse switch located on the butt-end. With the firearm in the strong hand, the fingers of the OFF hand are wrapped around the light, thumb on the pulse switch. This is known as the Harries technique. As such, the hands can still be used in conjunction to stabilize both the weapon and the light. One can use the light to illuminate the target and, with enough practice, search with the light without pointing the gun directly at the center of the beam

of light. The goal here is to keep the light and the gun close enough to each other to properly index the pistol if you need to, but also allow you to search without pointing the gun at what might be an innocent bystander in a dark room. Too, the light can be operated as the switch intends, in pulses, rather than in a continuous, “Here I am, Bad Guy” beam. Simply explained, perhaps, but performing this feat requires both manual dexterity *and* practice.

Gun-mounted lights come in two basic forms – a traditional flashlight in miniature that is

affixed to the frame beneath the barrel using a special bracket or rail, and a laser unit that actually projects a small, often red, light onto the target. This laser light, or dot, coincides with the weapon’s point of impact. Both have their pros and cons. The traditional mini-light, when operated continuously as is often the case, can reveal your position; however, this same light, detached, can be operated in the same pulse manner as is any hand-held. The laser, on the other hand, simplifies aiming, yet can be alarmingly ineffective in bright light situations. Here,

as in many cases, it becomes a matter of personal preference, and then, familiarity.

**Sights** – Like lights, sights for the defensive pistol are largely a matter of personal preference. Condensed, there are four options:

Iron, traditional – These are the unpainted/unaltered out-of-the-box iron sights with which many of us grew up. They’re simple, can be adjustable or fixed, and allow for quick and easy target acquisition. Their downfall, however, comes in the dark, where they have a tendency to disappear.

Iron, colored – Here, several options, all revolving around the colors of the front sight and rear blade are available. There is the traditional and well-known “red ramp” where a portion of the front sight is milled away and filled in with color epoxy. Three-dot sights allow the shooter to simply line up the dots. They can be all white or a combination with the dots on the left and right of the rear blade one color and the front sight another color – white-green-white is common. There is the U/dot. Simply put the dot of the front sight inside the white U of the rear sight and you’re in business. SIG-Sauer has made famous the dash and dot system with the vertical dash on the rear blade. Simply “dot the i” and you have your sight picture. For low light shooting, you can have glow-in-the-dark paint or Tritium inserts. Tritium is a radioactive isotope of hydrogen that glows in the dark. It is commonly used to illuminate the hands and markers of modern analog watch faces. Because it does glow, tritium makes for an excellent choice in low and no-light situations. And because it requires no batteries...well, that’s just one less thing you have to worry about, isn’t it? The options are almost endless and there is an entire market for optional sights that shooters can explore.

Electronic – Optical electronic sights have come a long way in

recent years. While these mini marvels were once restricted to rifles or carbines, the size of the sights has dropped while the durability has improved. The optical electronic sight is now a realistic option for defensive handgun use. A couple of different styles from several makers are available. They are easy to use and quite accurate.

Laser or illuminating – The aforementioned laser sights, those which project a beam of red light onto the target, complete the more common choices. It should be noted that laser sights are not a cure-all, and should be employed in lieu of practice and familiarization with the firearm of your choice.

**Grips** – It’s essential that the pistol you choose for defense (1) fit, (2) be comfortable, and (3) be manageable from a recoil standpoint. Fortunately, all three of these points can be addressed simply by changing the grips.

Grips, for those unfamiliar with the nomenclature, are those pieces located on either side of the firearm’s frame and around which the hand is wrapped. Traditionally, grips were made of wood, hard plastic, ivory, staghorn, or other natural materials; however, in recent decades, high-tech rubber grips have very much come into their own.

In the case of most firearms and their shooters, the choice concerning grips is as individual a decision as is the make and

model of handgun itself. The key, then, is personal fit, a variable which can only be determined by a trial. Sometimes you can grab the grip and know if it feels good or bad. But a true test can only be made by firing live rounds – the more the better. If, as was mentioned previously, the factory grips provide the performance you expect and need, don’t change them. If they don’t and you opt for aftermarket grips, install them yourself or have them installed by a competent gunsmith, and then try the piece on the range. What you are looking for in a good grip is what some people call “full engagement.” Your hand is, to use the industrial term, the control surface. You must be able to get a firm hold on the gun and keep that hold regardless of stress, perspiration, sudden violent movement or anything else that may try to separate the gun from your hand. The grip also has to be the right size to allow you to fully reach the trigger of the pistol.

Combat trigger control is different than that of the target shooter. You should be able to reach the trigger with the first joint of the index finger. Target shooters will use just the tip of the finger. Remember too, that if the gun doesn’t fit, the problem may be that the frame is too large or too small. Look carefully and asked a qualified instructor if you have questions. ❖

### SMITH & WESSON

The section on Smith & Wesson handguns has been reorganized to make it easier to use and understand. First, it has been divided into revolvers and semi-automatics with revolvers listed first.

Second, these two major areas are delineated further with revolvers divided into four distinct groups: Early Models, Small (I and J) Frames, Medium (K and L) Frames, Large (N) Frames; and semi-automatics divided into five groups: Pre-WWII, Post-WWII, 2nd Generation, 3rd Generation and Rimfire Target.

Today's Smith & Wessons all bear a model number and serial number. However, prior to 1958, S&W handguns bore only a serial number along with the specific name of that model, e.g. 38 Military & Police. In 1958, the factory began using a model numbering system. On revolvers, the model designation is stamped in the yoke cut in the frame and covered by the cylinder arm when the cylinder is in the closed position. The official serial number can be found on the butt of the gun. For revolvers factory-issued with target stocks that cover the butt, the serial number is

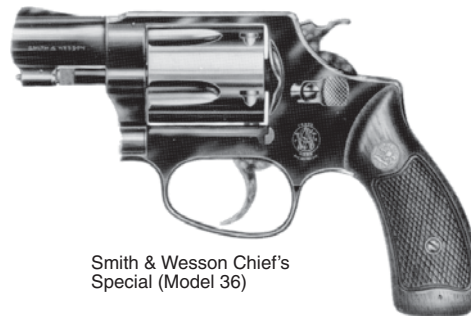

1. There is also a number stamped on the yoke which is called the work number. There is no relationship between this number and the serial number.

2. Handguns are classified by basic model numbers. The number following the model number is called the dash number and is necessary only when ordering parts.

On semi-automatics, the serial number can be found on the left side of the frame along with the model designation.

In addition to the state provisions, the purchase, sale, and, in certain circumstances, the possession and interstate transportation of firearms are regulated by the Federal Gun Control Act of 1968 as amended by the Firearms Owners' Protection Act of 1986. Also, cities and localities may have their own gun ordinances in addition to federal and state restrictions. Details may be obtained by contacting local law enforcement authorities or by consulting your state's firearms law digest compiled by the NRA Institute for Legislative Action.

# COMPENDIUM OF STATE LAWS GOVERNING FIREARMS

With over 20,000 "gun control" laws on the books in America, there are two challenges facing every gun owner. First, you owe it to yourself to become familiar with the federal laws on gun ownership. Only by knowing the laws can you avoid innocently breaking one.

Second, while federal legislation receives much more media attention, state legislatures and city councils make many more decisions regarding your right to own and carry firearms. NRA members and all gun owners must take extra care to be aware of anti-gun laws and ordinances at the state and local levels.

## Notes:

1. In certain cities or counties.
2. **National Instant Check System (NICS) exemption codes:**  
**RTC**-Carry Permit Holders Exempt From NICS  
**GRTC**-Holders of RTC Permits issued before November 30, 1998 exempt from NICS. Holders of more recent permits are not exempt.  
**L**-Holders of state licenses to possess or purchase or firearms ID cards exempt from NICS.  
**O**-Other, See Note 3.
3. **NICS exemption notes:** **Arkansas:** RTC permits issued prior to 11/30/98 and those issued on and after 4/1/99 qualify. Those issued between 11/1/98 and 3/31/99 do not qualify. **Indiana:** Personal protection, hunting and target permits all qualify for exemptions. **Kentucky:** RTC permits issued after July 15, 1998 and prior to November 30, 1998 are exempt. **Maryland:** There are no exemptions for handgun purchases. For long gun purchases, those holding RTC permits issued before November 30, 1998 are exempt. **Michigan:** No exemptions for handguns, license for long guns. **Mississippi:** Permits issued to security guards do not qualify. **Texas:** Texas Peace Officer License, TCLEOSE Card, is valid only if issued prior to November 30, 1998. **Washington:** RTC permits issued after July 1, 1996 and prior to November 30, 1998 are exempt.
4. Chicago only. No handgun not already registered may be possessed.
5. **Arkansas** prohibits carrying a firearm "with a purpose to employ it as a weapon against a person." **Tennessee** prohibits carrying "with the intent to go armed." **Vermont** prohibits carrying a firearm "with the intent or purpose of injuring another."
6. Loaded.
7. New York City only.
8. A permit is required to acquire another handgun before 30 days have elapsed following the acquisition of a handgun.
9. **Maryland** subjects purchases of "assault weapons" to a 7-day waiting period.
10. May be extended by police to 30 days in some circumstances. An individual not holding a driver's license must wait 90 days.
11. Carrying a handgun openly in a motor vehicle requires a license.
12. Every person arriving in **Hawaii** is required to register any firearm(s) brought into the State within 3 days of arrival of the person or firearm(s), whichever occurs later. Handguns purchased from licensed dealers must be registered within 5 days.
13. Concealed carry laws vary significantly between the states. Ratings reflect the real effect a state's particular laws have on the ability of citizens to carry firearms for self-defense.
14. Purchases from dealers only. **Maryland:** 7 business days. Purchasers of regulated firearms must undergo background checks performed by the State Police, either through a dealer or directly through the State Police.
15. The waiting period does not apply to a person holding a valid permit or license to carry a firearm. In **Connecticut**, a hunting license also exempts the holder for long gun purchasers. **California:** transfers of a long gun to a person's parent, child or grandparent are exempt from the waiting period.
16. **Connecticut:** A certificate of eligibility or a carry permit is required to obtain a handgun and a carry permit is required to transport a handgun outside your home. **District of Columbia:** No handgun may be possessed unless it was registered prior to Sept. 23, 1976 and re-registered by Feb. 5, 1977. A permit to purchase is required for a rifle or shotgun. **Hawaii:** Purchase permits, required for all firearms, may not be issued until 14 days after application. A handgun purchase permit is valid for 10 days, for one handgun; a long gun permit is valid for one year, for multiple long guns. **Illinois:** A Firearm Owner's Identification Card (FOI) is required to possess or purchase a firearm, must be issued to qualified applicants within 30 days, and is valid for 5 years. **Iowa:** A purchase permit is required for handguns, and is valid for one year, beginning three days after issuance. **Massachusetts:** Firearms and feeding devices for firearms are divided into classes. Depending on the class, a firearm identification card (FID) or class A license or class B license is required to possess, purchase, or carry a firearm, ammunition thereof, or firearm feeding device, or "large capacity feeding device." **Michigan:** A handgun purchaser must obtain a license to purchase from local law enforcement, and within 10 days present the license and handgun to obtain a certificate of inspection. **Minnesota:** A handgun transfer or carrying permit, or a 7-day waiting period and handgun transfer report, is required to purchase handguns or "assault weapons" from a dealer. A permit or transfer report must be issued to qualified applicants within 7 days. A permit is valid for one year, a transfer report for 30 days. **Missouri:** A purchase permit is required for a handgun, must be issued to qualified applicants within 7 days, and is valid for 30 days. **New Jersey:** Firearm owners must possess a FID, which must be issued to qualified applicants within 30 days. To purchase a handgun, a purchase permit, which must be issued within 30 days to qualified applicants and is valid for 90 days, is required. An FID is required to purchase long guns. **New York:** Purchase, possession and/or carrying of a handgun require a single license, which includes any restrictions made upon the bearer. New York City also requires a license for long guns. **North Carolina:** To purchase a handgun, a license or permit is required, which must be issued to qualified applicants within 30 days. **Ohio:** Some cities require a permit-to-purchase or firearm owner ID card.
17. Preemption through judicial ruling. Local regulation may be instituted in **Massachusetts** if ratified by the legislature.
18. Except Gary and East Chicago and local laws enacted before January, 1994.
19. **Vermont and Alaska** law respect your right to carry without a permit. Alaska also has a permit to carry system to establish reciprocity with other states.
20. "Assault weapons" are prohibited in **California, Connecticut, New Jersey and New York.** Some local jurisdictions in **Ohio** also ban "assault weapons." **Hawaii** prohibits "assault pistols." **California** bans "unsafe handguns." **Illinois:** Chicago, Evanston, Oak Park, Morton Grove, Winnetka, Wilmette, and Highland Park prohibit handguns; some cities prohibit other kinds of firearms. **Maryland** prohibits "assault pistols" and the sale or manufacture of any handgun manufactured after Jan. 1, 1985, that appears on the Handgun Roster. **Massachusetts:** It is unlawful to sell, transfer or possess "any assault weapon or large capacity feeding device" [more than 10 rounds] that was not legally possessed on September 13, 1994. **Ohio:** some cities prohibit handguns of certain magazine capacities. **Virginia** prohibits "Street Sweeper" shotguns. **The District of Columbia** prohibits new acquisition of handguns and any semi-automatic firearm capable of using a detachable ammunition magazine of more than 12 rounds capacity. (With respect to some of these laws and ordinances, individuals may retain prohibited firearms owned previously, with certain restrictions.)
21. Local jurisdictions may opt out of prohibition.
22. Preemption only applies to handguns.
23. Requires proof of safety training for purchase. **California:** Must have Handgun Safety Certificate receipt which is valid for five years. **Connecticut:** To receive certificate of eligibility, must complete a handgun safety course approved by the Commissioner of Public Safety. **Hawaii:** Must have completed an approved handgun safety course. **Maryland:** Must complete an approved handgun safety course. **Michigan:** A person must correctly answer 70% of the questions on a basic safety review questionnaire in order to obtain a license to purchase. **New York:** Some counties require a handgun safety training course to receive a license. **Rhode Island:** Must receive a state-issued handgun safety card.
24. "Assault weapon" registration. **California** had two dates by which assault weapons had to be registered or possession after such date would be considered a felony: March 31, 1992 for the named make and model firearms banned in the 1989 legislation and December 31, 2000 for the firearms meeting the definition of the "assault weapons in the 1999 legislation. In **Connecticut**, those firearms banned by specific make and model in the 1993 law had to be registered by October 1, 1994 or possession would be considered a felony. A recent law requires registration of additional guns by October 1, 2003. In **New Jersey**, any "assault weapon" not registered, licensed, or rendered inoperable pursuant to a state police certificate by May 1, 1991, is considered contraband.
25. Local governments cannot enact ordinances that prohibit the sale, purchase, or possession of a firearm. Municipalities cannot restrict a person's ability to travel into, through, or within their jurisdiction for hunting or personal protection. Local governments, including law enforcement agencies, cannot maintain a database of guns or gun owners. Municipalities may prohibit open carry in government buildings if such prohibition is clearly posted.

- R: Right-to-Carry "Shall issue" or less restrictive discretionary permit system (Ala., Conn.) (See also note #21.)  
L: Right-to-Carry Limited by local authority's discretion over permit issuance.  
D: Right-to-Carry Denied, no permit system exists; concealed carry is prohibited.





# Guide to Right-to-Carry Reciprocity and Recognition



- **The right to self-defense neither begins nor ends at a state border.**
- **A law-abiding citizen does not suffer a character change by crossing a state line.**
- **An “unalienable right” is not determined by geographical boundaries.**
- **A patchwork of state laws regarding the carrying of firearms can make criminals out of honest folks, especially those who frequently must travel the states to earn a living.**
- **Using data for all 3,054 U.S. counties from 1977 to 1994, University of Chicago Prof. John Lott finds that for each additional year a concealed handgun law is in effect the murder rate declines by 3%, robberies by over 2%, and the rape rate by 2%.**

In spite of the truth of these statements and the fact that nearly half of all Americans live in states that allow a law-abiding citizen to carry a firearm concealed for personal protection, it has not been commonplace that these same citizens could carry their firearm across states lines. NRA-ILA is working to pass right-to-carry reciprocity laws granting permit holders the ability to carry their firearms legally while visiting or traveling beyond their home state.

In order to assist NRA Members in determining which states recognize their permits, NRA-ILA has created this guide. This guide is not to be considered as legal advice or a restatement of the law. It is important to remember that state carry laws vary considerably. Be sure to check with state and local authorities outside your home state for a complete listing of restrictions on carrying concealed in that state. Many states restrict carrying in bars, restaurants (where alcohol is served), establishments where packaged alcohol is sold, schools, colleges, universities, churches, parks, sporting events, correctional facilities, courthouses, federal and state government offices/buildings, banks, airport terminals, police stations, polling places, any posted private property restricting the carrying of concealed firearms, etc. In addition to state restrictions, federal law prohibits carrying on military bases, in national parks and the sterile area of airports. National Forests usually follow laws of the state wherein the forest is located.

**NOTE:** Alaska and Vermont allow the concealed carry of firearms without a permit. Vermont residents traveling to other states must first obtain a non-resident permit from that state—if available—prior to carrying concealed. Alaska still issues permits to those who want them, allowing them to benefit by recognition and reciprocity laws.

**NOTE TO READERS:** Right To Carry reciprocity and recognition between the various states is subject to frequent change through legislative action and regulatory interpretation. This information is the best available at the time of publication. This summary is not intended as legal advice or restatement of law.

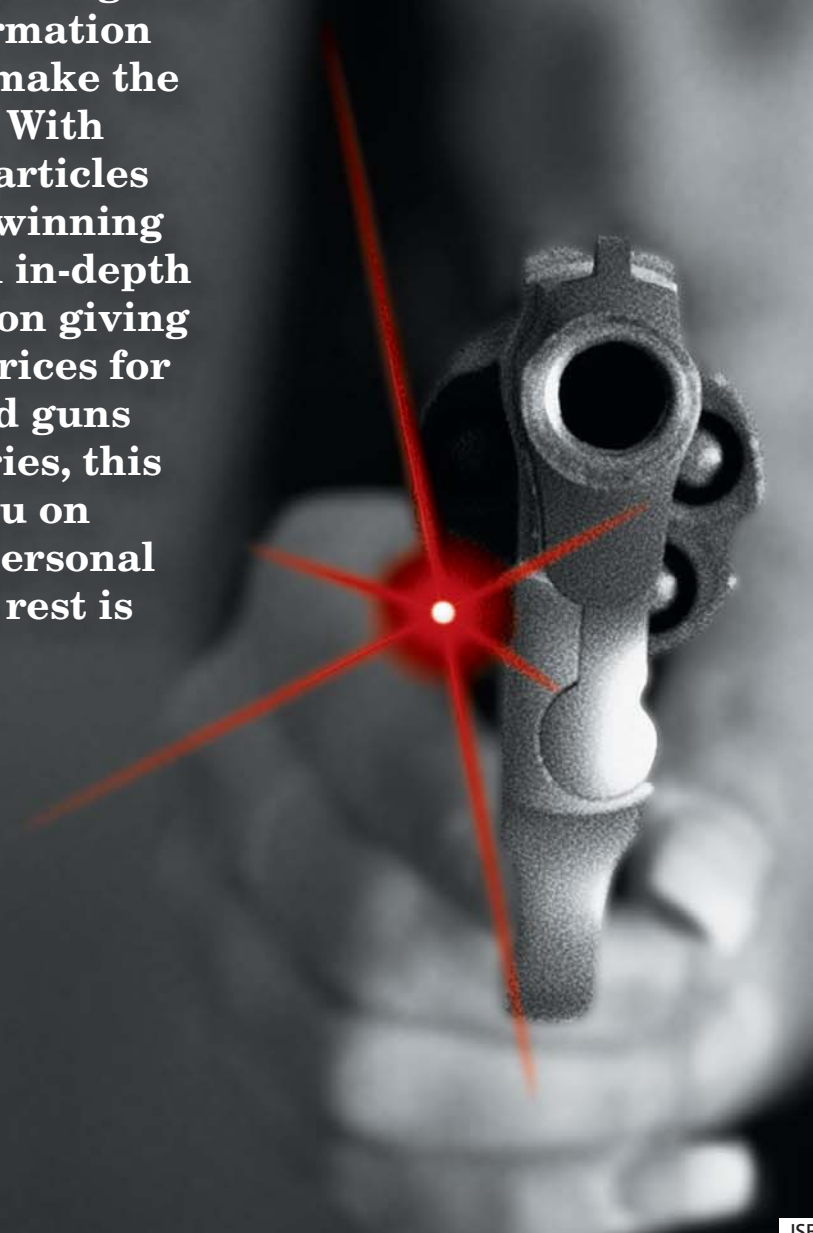
